BOARD'S DISCUSSION ON CORRESPONDENCE: No comments were made from the Town Board on the correspondence.

POLICE LIEUTENANT KEITH SLESINSKI - Good evening, everybody. The Town of Warwick PD, we received notification that we'll once again be getting a \$10,000 grant for National Night Out for 2026. WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Absent.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thank you Supervisor. My report is mainly about Mountain Lake Park. Construction on the pools continues. With the existing pools, they worked on bonding and grounding the pools before they installed the coping. So that's almost done, and coping should be going on pretty soon after the inspection. For the new wading pool, they poured the concrete footings, and they're going to be working on the plumbing next for that pool, and that pool is going to have a few bubblers, which is going to be really fun for families when they come out to the park. So, I encourage you, again, to come and take a look at the pool. It looks really neat.

For upcoming events, we have the Boy Scouts camping out this weekend at the park. Hopefully, they have good weather for their campout.

We also are going to have very busy in the kitchen at the park because of Thanksgiving. Some of the chefs make meals that will be delivered, so they'll be busy in the kitchen.

I had a visit today from the Supervisor at the park, and that was great. He took a look at the pools, the arts building, and during his visit, we saw a really majestic bald eagle. It just was a great reminder to me to encourage folks to get out to the parks and see them. They're beautiful. It's a little chilly, but, you know, you can dress for the weather and get out and enjoy the parks. I just wanted to wish everyone a Happy Thanksgiving.

SUPERVISOR DWYER – Sam was very nervous the bald eagle was going to swoop down and get a goose, so we had to walk away before that happened. Yeah, it was pretty cool. It was just flying circles around the pond. It was really quite cool.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER - It was hunting.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Oh, it certainly was, yeah.

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - There was four of them walking around in the road the other day. Right in the field.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Wow. Thank you, Sam.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - The Warwick Valley Humane Society, the pet photos with Santa and Mrs. Claus will take place this Saturday and Sunday, November 22nd and 23rd from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the animal shelter with a professional photographer. New background scene and treats for pets and kids. Dogs and large animals must be on leashes. Cats and small pets must be in carriers. It's \$25 with cash preferred for two poses of your choice, and all proceeds benefit the homeless pets this holiday season.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Last Sunday at the Landmark, I participated with an event they had for the Rumshock Organization that is going to supply housing for Veterans. The facility is going to be built over the Port Jervis area. It was a very successful event. About 50, 60 people were there, and looking forward to seeing the completion of that project in the next few years.

The battery committee is going to meet in early December. The committee members have gotten outlines of ordinances from other towns. I went out and took some in case anybody hadn't had a chance to go out and see what one looks like. I took some pictures of the facilities recently. I'll distribute them to the committee members just so they understand what the buffer is currently in access and everything like that is and we'll continue to do our due diligence on getting that ordinance accepted by the town as soon as we can.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great. Thank you, Councilman.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - Thank you, Supervisor Dwyer. In the Village of Warwick, Santa will be on Railroad Green in the Village of Warwick on Sunday, November 30, 2025. From noon until 3:00 p.m., that is a free event. The Warwick Historical Society Cookbook Release Party will be held on Sunday, November 23, 2025 at the A.W. Buckbee Events Center, located at 2 Colonial Avenue in Warwick. Admission is \$40.

The Christmas tree lighting in the Village of Warwick is Friday, November 28, starting at 6:00 p.m. at Lewis Park in the Village.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - Uh, didn't I say when that was? It is, it's in Pine Island? I don't have that.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Russ, do you know when that might be?

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - No.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay. If we can find that out.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Go to their website.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - It's not on their website?

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - It's not on their website.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay, let's try to track that down if we can.

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - if anyone wants to donate for Toys for Tots, Collection Point is at the Florida Firehouse. for the next couple of weeks before they bring it down to the train station. That's all I have to report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Really?

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - Yeah.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Wow.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - Also, I know this Saturday, the holiday season after Thanksgiving begins, there will be a lot of events going on in all the villages. I believe Village of Warwick, their wagon ride with Santa through the village starts. we also have a Toys for Tots collection going on in our lobby here along with a coat drive. Happy Thanksgiving, everybody.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Are you sure it's 3P and not 3M?

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - We have them, too. 3M and 3P

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Because that's Sterling. That's incredible.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - You don't get a waiting list. You get a 3P.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Wow. Just to clarify, the electric bid is related to the Mountain Lake Park pool infrastructure, and it's all grant-funded. My report is going to be relatively brief, even though I have a list of about 75 things right here that I went over with the Town Board during our workshop. Just a quick update on the DOT roadwork projects. They have completed paving for the 2025 season. They're really just touching up a few different spots. They're still working in the Village of Warwick and the Village of Florida, as well as some spots within the town, but they're putting most of their focus right now on trying to button up the Village of Florida and really get that ready for the winter season where they're not going to be continuing major road work. So, it's progressing well. They are ahead of schedule with regard to the town south of the Village of Warwick, but I think they may be a little bit

behind schedule in the Village of Florida where they've encountered some rock and some other challenges.

The town is continuing to work on our Park Master Plan. Over the next, I would say, few weeks, you're going to start seeing some survey information. We're going to publish some surveys trying to gain public feedback on what the town and what the residents would like to see as far as improvements with their facilities and the parks and the public access and outdoor recreation. So, keep an eye out for that.

Simultaneously, we are finishing up our updated website. Every town in the State of New York had to comply with a new law that requires a town to be a .gov and has to have certain components. We took it a step further, and we have incorporated a major section of our website related to parks and making sure that the entire town knows what every single park within the town offers. Is it ADA accessible? Does it have a bathroom? Is it a hiking trail? And what facilities are there? I know the Recreation Director has been working very hard with our website designer on getting that done. We plan to launch that website within the next few weeks, and it will be a .gov. Unfortunately, we couldn't get warwick.gov because the new requirements say if there's more than one Warwick in the entire country, that you have to have townofwarwickny.gov. So, somehow, we've made our current domain name even longer. So instead of it being townofwarwick.org, it will be townofwarwickny.gov. That's what our website is going to be. You can continue to send emails to the .org, so whatever email address you have on file, you can continue using that indefinitely as we change over to the .gov and beyond.

We had a conversation as a Town Board regarding the retail sales of marijuana revenue sharing. As the state introduced a law that allowed retail sales of marijuana, certain municipalities could opt out of allowing retail sales within their community and within their town and several years back, the Town of Warwick, in conjunction with the villages, made a deal. The villages would opt out of allowing retail sales of marijuana, and the town would opt into allowing retail sales of marijuana at very specific locations, two zones within the town. One zone is the area by Ronald Reagan Boulevard, and the other area is over by Price Chopper and the Dodge dealership. Those are the two zones that are permitted and, in the conversation, I was a mayor at that time, advocating for the village opting out of it, but making sure the town opted in to deal with all the problems, and then now, look, I've got to be in this position. But one of the things that we advocated for as mayors at the time was that the Town of Warwick would have some sort of a revenue sharing agreement with the villages, since the villages would opt out of the retail sales. So what the Town Board has agreed to, which is something that we talked about as a group of the mayors and the Town Supervisor at the time, was a revenue sharing system in which the town would take the revenue that we're getting from the State of New York by having a retail sales marijuana shop in the town, and we would divide that up among the villages that have opted out and are not participating in any sort of a revenue receipt from the retail sales. The formula will be determined by population, similar to how sales tax is distributed among the towns and the villages and the cities and the county. We will have a similar formula and model that we will distribute the revenue that the town is receiving from sales tax related to retail sales of marijuana. The projection for the retail sales tax that will be distributed between the town and the villages is a combined \$100,000 approximately next year. So, it is no small change deal. I mean, this is a really beneficial thing to support our government. So, we look forward to sharing that with the villages as we have historically done when situations like this would arise.

Finally, we underwent a feasibility study to determine if solar would be a good option for the buildings that the town owns, specifically the town hall building, the senior center, the DPW building, which is a flat roof structure, as well as the dial-a-bus building. The results of the feasibility study will be given to me in a meeting next week, and we'll share that with the board. We'll talk about it, see if it makes sense. This was no cost for us to do this feasibility study. So, once we have that completed, we'll talk about it as a board. If we feel like it is something that we want to move in that direction, we'll share the details with the public and see where we end up going. That concludes my report.

WHEREAS, by accepting a fixed-rate plan for all of the Town's energy costs, the Town will save taxpayer money spent on energy costs over the recommended period of time;

WHEREAS, the Town Board has determined that it is in the overall best interests of the residents of the Town to enter into a contract with Constellation for the aforesaid utilities fixed-rate plan;

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Warwick hereby authorizes the Town Supervisor to execute a contract with Constellation to fix the Town's energy costs in accordance with the proposal annexed hereto for a period of December 2, 2025 through December 23, 2028, along with any other appropriate documents to effectuate the intent of this Resolution, all of which shall be subject to review and approval by the Town Attorney.
