REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER - Thank you, Supervisor. A brief report tonight for the board. The Junior Police Academy registration was announced yesterday on social media. We encourage anyone interested to register as early as possible as the class sizes are limited

to 25 recruits. This program is open to any 10- to 15-year-old that lives in the Town of Warwick or the three Villages. To register, the site is www.wpdjpa.com and it is on our Facebook page as well.

A reminder that there are multiple construction zones throughout the town that will be working until late fall or early winter. There will be delays and detours, so allow extra time. Respect any neighborhoods that you will be detouring through and keep the safety of the workforce as a top priority. We have directed our patrol units to focus on committing time patrolling in and around the work zones and to utilize strict enforcement.

The opening day for the Warwick Little League is this Saturday. It begins with a parade that starts at 10 a.m. on Main Street to Railroad Avenue, then up to South Street, to Parkway, up to Park Lane, and then to Veterans Memorial Park. We will be on hand to assist with the road closures and detours.

And finally, April is Child Abuse Awareness Month. We work very closely with the Orange County Child Advocacy Center in Goshen to investigate reports of child abuse. We placed a sign in front of the station promoting awareness. That's all I have, unless there's any questions from the board.

DEPUTY DPW COMMISSIONER WILLIAM ROE - We have a ditch crew out every day, most every day. We have a brush crew-out, and we also have the hotboxes out every day, filling potholes, trying to keep up with it all. We are also hauling road grit to our stockpile. As far as the parks department they are all open and all the bathrooms are open too. Saturday is the big day. Everything is open. It's the first day of the season.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATT MCPHERSON – Good evening, everyone. It's a busy time of the year for us at the Water Department. We began starting up the Greenwood Lake summer water. We'll be down there flushing water and repairing any leaks in the next couple of weeks in Indian Park, Furnace Brook, Blueberry Trail. We're still aiming to have all the summer water on by April 15th. We opened up all the seasonal water systems, like Bill was just saying, including the town park, the soccer field, concession stand, and the Union Corners Road, as well as Pine Island Park. This includes disinfecting wells, flushing lines, taking samples, and making sure the chlorine system is operating.

Tomorrow, we'll be fixing a water service line leak in Wickham Knolls on Park Drive with the DPW. We helped Sam with a water service leak up in Mountain Lake Park, but I think it still needs a little more investigating, which we'll take a look at next week. We continue to make minor repairs to the water treatment plant and keep it running to the best of its ability. Outside of the daily maintenance and routine operations. We've made a few minor repairs on the traveling bridge and belt press. The plant overall has been running well within the consent order limits. We're looking to do a spring hydrant flush on all districts, tentatively the first week of May.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thank you Supervisor. I just wanted to thank DPW and the Water Department for coming out to Mountain Lake Park and helping us out. DPW helped with a lot of widow makers or hangers in the trees that were large, so those are all taken care of, so things look good there.

Parks are busy getting water back on. The pools are still being worked on. The pool tile is being installed. It looks really great. That's the one the supervisor picked out. It looks awesome. The wading pool has not been shot yet with the concrete, so hopefully tomorrow. It got a little wet, so that's why they had to wait for the weather to dry out a little bit before they did that. Pool membership passes are on sale. You can get them at Town Hall. Best prices are now. Swim lesson registration opened up on April 1, and we did that online and I think the parents really appreciated not having to wait on a huge line this year. We have already filled it up in our parent-child classes and our beginner classes and the backup classes for those age groups. I am making a waiting list, so if you still want to get in swim lessons for children 6 and under, just send me an email, and I'll try to get you in or create a new class for you.

We have some upcoming events at the park. The Iron Horse Sanctuary in Goshen is having their second annual dance party. It's a fundraiser for the barn cats that live at the sanctuary, so it's a really great event. That is next Saturday, April 18th, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. it's \$20, suggested donation, kids under 17 are free. Its dancing, some snacks, games, and things like that. There is another event at the park is through Sustainable Warwick. They're having a native tree and shrub sale, and that will be on April 24th, which is Friday, and Saturday, April 25th. Time is to be determined still, but it's a great event if you want to get some native plants. You can get plants pre-sale on Sustainable Warwick's website. That is, it for my report.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - Okay, good evening. For the Town of Warwick Humane Society, the Humane Society's first fundraiser of the year will take place on Sunday, April 12th, with the marriage of Taz and Annie, two small dogs, who have been at the shelter since September of 2025. The ceremony and reception will be at the Last Whiskey Bar in Wickham Woodlands, beginning at 1:00 p.m. Gift donation of \$45 per person or \$80 per couple will be accepted on their behalf at the door. Guests are asked to wear something orange in recognition of April as Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Month.

There are 13 rabbits available for adoption at the shelter. All are spayed and neutered. Most are litter box trained. Small animal applications for adoption are available at wvhumane.org.

The Town of Warwick spayed-neuter certificates for the Animal Rights Alliance low-cost spayed-neuter of cats are available at the shelter for only \$25 cash. Call 845-986-2473 for an appointment to purchase certificates to spay or neuter your cat or the cat or cats you feed. Animal Rights Alliance certificates cover the surgery and includes a one-year rabies vaccination. Preventing litters of kittens helps the adult cats, helps the neighborhood, and helps the shelter.

They have a wish list. Pate-style canned cat or kitten food, Merrick duck formula for dogs, both dry and canned, paper towels, large and small paper plates, laundry detergent, 13-gallon garbage bags. That's all I have.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Thank you. Well, our 250th anniversary of services and program continues with the Founders Day on May 17th at the Stonehouse Inn on County Route 1 from 2:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m. in the afternoon. There are going to be reenactors there. This year what they're going to feature is a historian has lined up several families in the area that have roots back to the Revolution, and they're going to give their accounts of what their families did during the Revolutionary period. I think there's about six or eight families that are going to be there. It'll be kind of interesting to see what they did and what side they were on and it should be a great day over there for that. And that's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER – You might question why we're not going with the lowest bidder for the fence. The reason is this is a New York State-funded grant, and unfortunately the lowest bidder is a New Jersey company that is not registered to do business in the State of New York. So that automatically forces us to use the second lowest bidder.

SUPERVISOR DWYER REPORT - We'll start with the road construction. I hope people are getting used to it. It's been with us for an entire year, and unfortunately, it's going to be with us for at least another year into next year. The road work is occurring all throughout the entire town right now. The roundabout, which was slated to begin in the spring, is ready to go. They've got all the utilities moved and prepped. The site is pretty much ready to be built out. The New York State DOT did throw the contractors a curveball by making a late request, which the contractor has to accommodate, and that's taking a little bit more time. So, the project at the roundabout at intersection 1A and Route 94, which was originally planned for April, has now been moved to, obviously, the end of this month, if not May. They are planning to do work on Colonial and Maple, which is going to cause significant traffic for us leaving Town Hall, obviously our police department, so that's something you guys are going to have to keep your eye on. also, if they time that, they were trying not to time the work to happen at the same time as the culvert by Larry's Deli. If that happens, then we're going to have some tricky situations to avoid. But another situation where the DOT has made requests at the Colonial Ave and Maple Ave intersection that the contractor, I have to say, is doing a great job trying to jump through a bunch of hurdles to get this project done. Huge inconvenience for everybody. We understand that. But we have to leave a little bit early, which I unfortunately forget to do sometimes, and it forces me to be a little bit late. But it's all for the sake of progress, and they're working really hard to try to get everything done. So, let's just be patient and plan accordingly.

We submitted a grant for a salt barn to Congressman Pat Ryan, and we have received informal confirmation that he is supporting and submitted this funding in the next congressional legislative bill package. That's a big hurdle. It's a big step. It doesn't guarantee us the money, but it is certainly a great step in the right direction for adding a new upgraded salt barn at our DPW yard. I've seen just in my short time that we're constantly struggling after every storm to maintain adequate salt levels, and then you get hit with a winter like we had this year, and it really proved how vulnerable municipalities can be if they cannot store enough salt. We're the largest town with more town roads than any other town in Orange County, and we were struggling to keep up with the salt demand this year. So, we really appreciate Congressman Ryan's support in pushing this through, and we're going to cross our fingers and hope for the best, but it's looking really good.

At our workshop tonight, I introduced a concept to the Town Board to apply for a community development block grant program through HUD for \$275,000 for bathrooms and ADA accessibility components at Mountain Lake Park, specifically around the pickleball courts and the pool area. So, we will be presenting for public hearing a proposal to apply for a community development block grant for upgraded ADA accessible bathrooms in Mountain Lake Park.

We are also applying for a grant to do a planning grant for Wickham Woodlands Park, which will include potential for trail improvements, bathroom facilities, pedestrian and ADA improvements, water access for both passive and non-passive recreation, and also the potential building uses. The Town of Warwick has three buildings at Wickham Woodlands

Park, and we're looking at doing a comprehensive planning analysis for how the entire park, as well as our facilities, can be used better for the public.

I'm happy to announce, I don't believe the police chief did in his own report about the DHSES Grant. The Chief successfully applied for and awarded on behalf of the Town of Warwick a \$60,000 grant for a bomb detection dog. Last year, was it last year? Our canine retired. So, this will replace our previous bomb detection canine and make sure that we continue to have that great much-needed program. So, great work on that grant, and happy to keep that program in place.

We also received a \$15,000 grant for IT cybersecurity analysis, comprehensive analysis for all of our IT security systems. So, we will move forward with that.

I have announced and introduced a new initiative that I'm going to be doing starting next Tuesday, which will be called Coffee with a Supervisor, and it will be a way that we will bring all of our department heads from the Town of Warwick to one table out in the public, and it will be traveling to different parts across the town. This upcoming Tuesday, we'll be at 1 Oakland in the Village of Warwick at 9:00 a.m., and you will have an opportunity to come out, talk to me, talk to the board, talk to any one of our nine department heads, whether it's the Police Chief, water, sewer issues, recreation issues. Our Receiver of Taxes will be there. Our Town Assessor will be there. You name it, any department head will be there, and it's going to be a great opportunity for not only the public to meet them, but for some of our town department heads to collaborate on some issues and make sure that everybody's in the loop on certain things. They don't always get to meet and talk to each other, so it'll be a really nice opportunity for everybody to be in the same room and to give the public the accessibility factor where they can meet with our department heads and me. So, again, we're going to move to different places. The first one will be Tuesday, April 14th at 1 Oakland, which is the former Cafe a la Mode in the Village of Warwick. The next one will be Tuesday, May 12th at Table 21 in Pine Island, followed by Tuesday, June 16th at Mattingly's Tavern in the Village of Florida, followed then by Greenwood Lake Roasters on Tuesday, July 21st. And, again, this will be from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. Obviously, we're not going to shut the door and walk out at 10 o'clock. If we're engaged in meaningful conversation with the public, we will stay as long as we can. Or as long as we need to. So, we look forward to seeing the public, and, again, the public is encouraged, and you can come out and have a cup of coffee on me. Not paid for by tax dollars, by the way.

One more. Tonight, I'm proud to share an important step forward in the Town of Warwick's longstanding commitment to preserving open space, expanding parkland, and protecting the character of our community. The Town of Warwick has partnered with the Open Space Institute to preserve approximately 313 acres of land surrounding the Warwick Conference Center. This is not just another land acquisition. It is part of a broader, decades-long effort to ensure that Warwick remains a place defined by its natural beauty, its open landscapes, and its thoughtful, balanced approach to growth. This will leave the Conference Center open for business with a remaining 100-acre campus. For more than 25 years, Warwick has led the way in open space preservation, protecting over 5,000 acres of land. Tonight's announcement builds directly on that success. This

acquisition represents our continued commitment to getting ahead of development pressure, not reacting to it after the fact. By securing this property, we are preventing the potential for overdevelopment, while simultaneously creating new opportunities for public use. This land will become a town preserve, adding to our park system, and offering residents expanded access to trails, passive recreation, and the outdoors. Perhaps most exciting, this property will help create meaningful connections, linking our existing town parks with regional trail systems, and even extending access into New Jersey's Wawayanda State Park. This is the kind of forward-thinking planning that enhances quality of life, not just for today's residents, but for generations to come. From a fiscal standpoint, this project is being pursued responsibly. The property is already mostly tax-exempt, meaning there will be little to no impact on our tax base. We are also aggressively pursuing outside funding, including a \$3.5 million grant through the New York State DEC Open Space Fund. This will significantly offset the town's investment. This is exactly what our Community Preservation Fund was designed to do. Protect critical lands, expand recreational opportunities, and ensure that Warwick continues to grow in a way that reflects our community values. Let me be clear, there will always be development, but in Warwick, we make sure that growth is balanced with preservation. This project is a perfect example of that philosophy in action. I want to thank the Open Space Institute for their partnership and shared vision. Together, we're not just preserving land, we're shaping the future of Warwick. That concludes my report.

WHEREAS, the Open Space Institute ("Owner") is a contract vendee and has entered into a contract of sale to purchase a portion of the premises known as the Warwick Conference Center, 3 Warwick Center Road, Warwick, New York and has offered to sell the premises to the Town of Warwick ("Town") for parkland and open space purposes, and

WHEREAS, the premises are known as a portion of Tax Parcels ID# 63 -1-10.22-1, 63-1-10.22-2 and 63-1-12 consisting of approximately 313 acres of land and are considered ideal for the express purpose of establishing a community forest and open space park and for the purpose of protecting the land from future development (herein the "Property"), and

WHEREAS, The Town Board of the Town of Warwick created a Community Preservation Advisory Board (“CPAB”) which board adopted a Community Preservation Project Plan (the “Plan”) which was approved by the Town Board of the Town of Warwick (“Town Board”) and has approved this Property for inclusion in the Plan, and

WHEREAS, Tax Parcels ID# 63 -1-10.22-1, 63-1-10.22-2 and 63-1-12 have been adopted and included as part of the Town Community Preservation Project Plan by the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Open Space Institute has offered to sell the Property to the Town of Warwick for the sum of \$3,975,100.00 based on 313 acres of land, and

WHEREAS, \$3,500,000.00 of the purchase price will be applied for through the New York DEC Open Space Conservation Grant Program and the balance plus closing costs of which may be up to \$600,000.00 shall be paid through the Town of Warwick Community Preservation Fund; and

WHEREAS, The Town Board determines that purchase of the Property benefits the Town and is in furtherance of the Town’s farmland and open space protection plan, and

WHEREAS, pursuant to State Environmental Quality Review Act (“SEQRA”), the Town of Warwick Town Board is required to satisfy the requirements of SEQRA prior to authorizing the Town Supervisor to enter into a contract of sale that commits the Town to the purchase of the property; and

WHEREAS, this resolution authorizing a letter of agreement qualifies as a Type 2 element of the overall action, more specifically it is part of the, “preliminary planning and budgetary processes necessary to the formulation of a proposal for action, provided those activities do not commit the agency to commence, engage in or approve such action,” and the Town Board finds that it is appropriate to segment this resolution from the larger SEQRA review of the land acquisition given the exigency of meeting the application and schedule requirements of the NYSDEC Open Space Conservation Grant Program, and on the basis that this resolution does not commit the Town Board to close on the purchase of the property unless and until the requirements of SEQRA are fully satisfied and thus it is no less protective of the environment.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Town Supervisor is authorized to enter into a Letter of Agreement for the purchase of the Property subject to and not exceeding the appraised value base on the 313 acres of land, contingent upon full satisfaction of the requirements of SEQRA and upon receiving a grant from the New York State DEC Open Space Conservation Grant Program, and the Town Supervisor is authorized to execute any and all documents necessary to apply for a grant in the amount of \$3,500,000.00 through the New York State DEC Open Space Conservation Grant Program.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR (GENERAL):

CHRIS PSKOWSKI – Resident, Village of Florida – Good evening two months or a month ago I missed last meeting. Two weeks ago, before that I was here and I was promised I'd get a phone call the next day and get that site plan

SUPERVISOR DWYER - That's not anywhere near accurate I said go to the planning department and you'll be able to pick up a copy of the site plan we didn't take down your phone number you wouldn't have gotten a call.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - I believe someone said I'd be contacted when it was ready.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Oh it's ready it's there they have it you had put the wrong section block and lot number on the application that's why they couldn't find it.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - So back in October but then I resubmitted it in January after I spoke to the Town Clerk and we clarified that.

SUPERVISOR DWYER – So, have you still not picked it up?

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - No I was waiting for it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - It's available anytime you go there.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - You guys did have my email. Also that evening I asked who interpreted the code which I don't even know what code it's falling under and you said it was interpreted by Mr. Krahulik your town attorney has anybody asked a question this is just a question if Mr. Krahulik was ever retained by Mr. Schreiberis?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - What are we talking about interpreting what code?

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - The code that Schreibeis is remember the recycling I don't even know what code it is because I've been out of town but under according to the New York Department of State under divisions of building and building standard code the ZBA has the final authority to interpret zoning codes the building inspector and enforcement officer can initially do a determination. It doesn't speak of anything about a town lawyer interpreting the code.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Are you requesting an interpretation of the code there is a process to do that you have to fill out an application for that to be done it doesn't just automatically happen.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - Well you asked Mr. Krahulik to interpret the code why wouldn't you go to the ZBA?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I asked him for his opinion of the code. I didn't ask for a specific interpretation.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - In the Town of Warwick isn't there a fee for me to go get the code interpreted?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - There's a procedure in place if a resident wants to have the code interpreted, they can do that. Just as the building inspector is the enforcement official that would go out and do investigations on property maintenance or other issues that you might have. So, I'm not really sure what you're trying to accomplish here

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - Would you be interested if the code is being interpreted properly? Because I've spoken to DEC and now, I've got some reaction from them.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - We've spoke with the DEC as well as my engineer. So, no I didn't just get an interpretation from Bob Krahulik. We had a full meeting with our engineer with our commissioner of DPW with our planning board chairman as well as an attorney and we all looked at exactly what you had mentioned and we all came to the same agreement. That's what we're going by right now. If you wish to further interpret that situation you would then have to go to the ZBA and ask for an interpretation of the code.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - There's no possible way for you people to do it? I went to another town and it cost me \$5,000 in fees and in two meetings they ate it up.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I kind of feel like we're just going to do a back and forth about your pet projects and what you're looking at accomplishing here. So, if you can just directly state what you're trying to accomplish and what you are looking for.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - It's not a pet project. I'm trying to get somebody to be concerned that there's a contamination of the farm fields, the Quaker Creek and possibly lands

around our grammar school in the Village of Florida, but it doesn't seem like anyone is really interested.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - As I said I immediately the very next morning had a meeting with all of our professionals and spoke with the DEC.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - I know and I was very impressed with that.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - We spoke with the DEC, not Bob Krahulik. Our engineer spoke with the DEC and confirmed that they have an active permit to do what they're doing. We have a copy of their permit which says exactly what they're doing. We do agree that it's somewhat of a gray situation and he is required to get some clarification on his site plan. So, I believe the last I checked on this he will be going to amend his site plan to more accurately reflect what he's doing now.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - Shouldn't it be shut down until it's amended?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - We don't feel that it warrants shutting down at this point in time.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - Who is the officer or who do you speak to at the DEC?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I don't have that with me right now.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - Because I went through several channels and I finally got to the right department.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - We have good numbers that we can get directly to certain people.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI - This is not a pet project.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I don't know, you came here last time with like six different things you just started throwing stuff at us and it seems like an unusual thing to do. I mean the proper channels to look at property complaints even with this one, are to go to the building department and fill out a form. The reason for that is it's great because it creates a paper trail just like your foil. So, when you go to the building department and you do that it starts a really good paper trail that's beneficial to us. So, that after you go there and you don't get what you need, you don't get the proper results, then you come to the Town Board and you say, hey look just like you did with the foil I foiled this, I didn't get it and out of my remarks the newspaper, you can look back and see I said it will be available for you tomorrow to pick up. That was true it was ready and I guarantee if you go to the planning department it is printed and it might even have your name on it. Printed, ready to go. So, what I would suggest to you if you've got these different things that you want to work on. Go to the building department and fill out a complaint form on any one of them. I don't care which one it is. Go through the channels for the people that are paid to look

into those things. Let them come back to you with their response. If that response is not adequate or sufficient for your needs, then you come to us and you say this is the response that I'm getting this is not good, this is not good enough. It creates a good paper trail and it's really the way to go.

CHRIS PSKOWSKI – Gotcha, thank you.

SUPERVISOR DWYER – Thank you.

NEXT MEETING: Supervisor Dwyer stated the next Town Board Meeting will be held on Thursday, April 23, 2026 at 7:00 p.m. and as always, it may be preceded by a workshop as early as 5:30 p.m.
