The regular meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Warwick was held on Thursday, March 26, 2026 at the Town Hall, 132 Kings Highway, Town of Warwick. Supervisor Dwyer called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER** - Okay, tonight, as you can see, we've got a full crowd. We have a presentation that will be made by Lori Mosher, and she will be highlighting some unsung heroes within our community. I would like to ask Lori to come up here, and if the fire department members, if you would please join us in the front, if you don't mind.

**PRESENTATION:** Lori Mosher, Director of Riley's Parade - Hello, my name is Lori Mosher, and I am here on behalf of Riley's Parade. Riley's Parade is a non-profit organization that is dedicated to raising awareness of and providing support to children and families directly affected by pediatric strokes, birth injuries, and prematurity. We work closely with the Ronald McDonald House by providing gift bags that contain necessary items to help the families feel comforted and supported while their children are receiving treatment.

In 2024, as part of an Eagle Scout service project, we purchased and donated a picnic table to the town to give the people a place to sit, relax, and enjoy the outdoors. Placed next to the memorial tree we had planted at the park, it felt like the perfect addition, like the tree had finally its own seating area. For a while, everything was exactly as we hoped it would be.

Then in early January, the table mysteriously disappeared. After searching the surrounding area and even checking other town parks with the help of Ben and his staff, we came up empty-handed. At that point, I was convinced the table had been stolen because picnic tables don't get up and leave, right? In a last-ditch effort to find it, I returned to the park very early on a Friday morning. As the sun rose over the lake, I noticed something strange just barely poking out of the water. At first, I wasn't sure what I was looking at, but as I got closer, it became clear. It was part of the picnic table bench sticking out of the icy lake like it had to try to make a run for it and didn't quite make it. Apparently, our picnic table hadn't been stolen after all. It had just taken an unexpected dive.

My family and I would like to express our profound gratitude to the following people. Kelly Brock, D.J. Gardner, Mike Contaxis, Chris DiMarco, Kevin Hughes, Joe Schweizer, Rich Pasiut, Dylan Claudio, Kevin Patterson, Zachary Vega, and Sean Quinn for your kindness, compassion, and care in rescuing the picnic table from the frozen water. What may have

appeared to be a simple object is in truth a memorial to an infant child who passed away just four days before Christmas at only seven months old in 2018. The table was placed as a place of remembrance, love, and quiet reflection, a small but meaningless way to honor life that was far too short and deeply cherished. When the table slipped into the icy water, it felt as though a piece of that memorial had been lost. Your response that day meant more than words can adequately express. You did not treat the situation lightly or dismiss its importance. Instead, you acted with professionalism, care, and humility, and because of you, a place of remembrance was restored. On what could have been a dark and frozen day, you answered the call, not for a cat in a tree, not a blazing inferno, but a humble picnic table that slipped beneath the icy surface of the water.

Where others might have seen just a table, you saw a mission, a purpose, and a chance to serve. Against the cold of the ice and the quiet judgment of anyone who might ask, is this really happening? You acted swiftly and heroically. Thanks to your courage and dedication, that picnic table was reunited with dry land, dignity restored, future sandwiches saved.

Please know that your actions did not go unnoticed. They remind us all that no rescue is too small, no table too wooden, and no emergency unworthy of professionalism and care. You showed up, you handled it, and you did it with the same seriousness and skill you bring to every call.

From the bottom of our hearts that are full of gratitude, awe, and feelings I truly never expected to feel about a picnic table, and on behalf of one extremely grateful picnic table, thank you for your service, your humor, and your willingness to brave the frozen unknown. Thank you for showing that service is not only about emergencies measured in flames and sirens, but also about compassion for the quiet, deeply personal moments that matter just as much. Your kindness will never be forgotten.

Melissa, I didn't forget you. I don't even know where to begin, because thank you never feels big enough for the way you show up for us and your community. You have an incredible way of being exactly where we need you, exactly when we need you, often without being asked, and always without hesitation. Your constant willingness to help, to step in, and to offer support in the big moments and the quiet ones mean more than we can ever put into words. In times that feel heavy, overwhelming, or uncertain, your presence brings steadiness and comfort. You don't just offer assistance, you offer reassurance, calm, and the reminder we are not alone. That kindness is rare and is deeply felt. Please know that your thoughtfulness, your generosity, and your unwavering support have made a lasting difference. We are so grateful for you, not just for what you do, but for who you are. Thank you for always being there, for seeing what is needed, and for giving so much of yourself with genuine care.

I also want to take a moment to thank Ben Astorino For your leadership, commitment, and care you constantly show, not only to your staff, but the entire community. Your willingness to go above and beyond does not go unnoticed, especially in the response to and coordination surrounding the recovery of the picnic table. While it may have seemed like a small and unusual request, you treated it with seriousness and care, ensuring it was handled properly and respectfully. That attention to detail and compassion speaks volumes about the way you

lead. You lead by example, always showing up with professionalism, dedication, and a genuine concern for the people you serve. Our community benefits every day through your hard work and steady presence. Whether in moments that require extra effort, or in the day-to-day work that keeps everything running smoothly, you continually demonstrate what true public service looks like. Thank you to all of you for all that you do, and for the difference that you make through your leadership and integrity. It is truly appreciated. I have a donation that I'd like to give to the fire department as well, to thank you for what you did that day.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER** - On behalf of the town, I want to thank you guys as well, and of course thank Ben and thank Sam. I know Sam traveled across the town looking for that picnic table as well. You guys are often unsung heroes, and it's not just fires that you guys put out. You answer the call when we request it. We know that you guys do a lot of training and ice training. We saw this as a really good opportunity for you guys to put your skills, continue to train, and use your resources to help not only retrieve a very sentimental picnic table, but also pull something out of the lake that doesn't belong in the lake. So, on behalf of the town, we appreciate you guys always responding to us and helping us out when we ask, and of course you know you can get the same from us. So, thank you all very much. You know you can stay for the whole meeting if you guys want. I know you don't have anything else to do. It's exhilarating. The agenda is jam-packed with all kinds of great stuff. Thanks for coming, guys, and thank you, Lori.

**REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:**

**POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER** - Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. I just have a brief report for tonight, starting off with I'm hoping we can take a rest from reminding our residents of safe driving around Warwick in the winter months, but we have to shift to safe driving now in and around the work zones. Our road rage and traffic complaint calls have spiked in the last two weeks. This is the second year of a multi-year plan to improve our roadways and infrastructure, and we need to keep it safe. Our officers will be conducting enforcement details at the work zone sites as well as the neighborhoods surrounding them where those secondary roadways are perceived to be shortcuts. The main message we want to convey to everybody is that they need to allow extra time for the foreseeable future to navigate around Warwick. So, we'll support all the road crews that are out there and the residents that are feeling the extra traffic on the roads and the extra wait times, but we need to do it safely.

I want to remind everybody about our Junior Police Academy program. We should be launching that on Facebook any day. First session is July 13th-24th, second session August 3rd-14th.

While we always ask everyone to keep our men and women in the service, currently serving the armed forces, in their thoughts and prayers, I would like to especially remember and keep Officer Tyler Morella, who went on a deployment last fall prior to this conflict starting, and is stationed somewhere in the Middle East right now. So, this one hits a little bit close to home for all of us.

Finally, we're preparing for the No Kings event on Saturday the 28th. I just want to let the residents know that Oakland Avenue will be closed from Orchard Street to West Street from 9:30 a.m. until 12 noon. We will have officers that will assist in the detour as well as those assigned to monitor the event to ensure the safety of the residents and the participants. We will also be receiving assistance from the New York State Police and the Orange County Sheriff's Office. That's all I have unless there's any questions from the board.

**DPW COMMISSIONER BENJAMIN ASTORINO** – Okay, this is the first report I think since early December that I'm not mentioning some sort of snow or treatment to the roads for ice or snow. So, I have a smile on my face. It was a tough winter. I think we made it

through all right. We had some issues with getting salt. Again, I'd like to thank the Chief and his department for, in the big storms, taking care of all the parking on the streets, and it made a huge difference. So, we really thank you so much. The cooperation, again, was outstanding between departments. We are gearing up for some spring work now. We did some work on Sills Court and Beverly Drive. We had some clogged catch phases. We backed those out. We just started the ditch work out here. We did some work by the impound lot for the police. That's done. Tree work, we did have a storm last week. There was wind and rain. Knocked some trees down. We cleaned that up. We are brushing on the Distillery Road. Potholes, we are still filling with cold mix. Youngs in West Milford does have hot mix. We got some today. The first time we got some. We're starting to use hot mix on the roads. Believe it or not, we are still fixing and repairing some mailboxes. These phantom mailboxes seem to get hit in 70-degree weather. We are replenishing our stockpile of road grit. We used a lot this winter, and we will replenish that to our full 100%.

**TOWN CLERK ASTORINO** – When are you opening the bathrooms at the parks?

**DPW COMMISSIONER BENJAMIN ASTORINO** – Madam Clerk, I forgot that in the report, so thank you for reminding me. We have one park employee over there now getting started, so probably first week of April. We're just getting everything ready to roll, and we'll be fully staffed over there probably mid-April.

**WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATT MCPHERSON** – I have a brief report tonight. A few things. Our guys completed quarterly meter reads out of all districts this week. Down in Greenwood Lake on Jersey Avenue, we had a motor vehicle accident to a fire hydrant, which we were able to put back together and get back into service.

Out in Pine Island, well, I know a lot of people out there are frustrated with waiting for this to be turned online. We have submitted everything from our end to the DEC., and the final approval to turn it on still waits with the DEC. Myself and the supervisor continue to badger them for their approval, but we don't have authorization yet to turn it on.

We have the Greenwood Lake summer system coming up. We'll begin to work over the next few weeks down there, turning on valves, fixing leaks. Indian Park, Blueberry Hill, Julie Lane, and Furnace Brook will be those areas getting that summer water turned on.

Sewer facilities have been operating within limits over the past few weeks. We're always making small repairs, keeping the places going. There's been no issues over the past few weeks. Other than that, drinking water and wastewater samples from March were collected and submitted monthly reports for all facilities, and preventive maintenance at all facilities for March.

**RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER** – Thank you, Supervisor. My report is brief also. It's great that the weather is getting better and people have been out to the park playing pickleball and starting to hike out there. The pool work is continuing now that the weather is better, so the mechanical room is nearly complete. It's about 60 percent complete for the coping, and they'll start the tile work soon for the pools, which will be really nice. Hopefully next week, possibly even Sunday, they'll be shooting the gunite for the concrete for the wade pool. So once that's done, it'll really look like a pool and it'll be a great time to come out and visit then.

I've been busy interviewing lifeguards for the summer. It looks like we have five new hires besides our returning guards from last year, so we should have a good crew to help with the pools this summer. Just want to remind everyone that the pool membership passes go on sale April 1st at Town Hall. Don't forget that local volunteer first responders, including firefighters, get 50 percent discount off their membership passes for the pool. Active military are free passes to the pool. Also want to remind folks that swim lesson registration opens April 1st. It's an online registration, so if you go to the town's website now under Mountain Lake Park Recreation Swim Lessons or Mountain Lake Park's website, same thing under Recreation Swim Lessons, the links there will only provide you information. They're not live yet to take your registration, but April 1st at 9 a.m. they'll go live and that's when you'll be able to sign up your child for summer swim lessons. That's it for my report.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER** - Got a good update today from our pool engineer. Who's confident that everything will be done and ready to go for Memorial Day, so that's very exciting.

**RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER** – Yes.

**TOWN BOARD REPORTS:**

**COUNCILMAN DEANGELO** - Okay, for the Warwick Valley Humane Society, the shelter is desperate desperately in need of canned food for dogs and cats and kittens. Their shelves are barren. So, anything you want to donate, they'll accept. Our shelter dogs prefer Merricks or Natural Balance, while cats and kittens want Pate only. Donations of these canned foods are greatly appreciated, with over 160 mouths to feed twice a day.

I mentioned this once before, their upcoming dog wedding is open to all who would like to see and enjoy the nuptials of two adorable canines with a cocktail party following at the Last Whiskey Bar in Wickham Woodlands on Sunday, April 12th from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. Food, music, and cash bar are included. **COUNCILMAN KOWAL** - Last Saturday, March 21st, I participated with the Town Historian and the Friends of Hathorn I have down at the Sterling Forest Visitor Center for Warwick Day. They had some displays there, some blacksmith displays, a few historic displays. I had the link there all month, because that's where the chain was mined and forged and it'll be there until the end of this month, and we'll bring that back. That's not the only thing that we're doing so far. We also have, on May 17th, at the Stonehouse Inn at the intersection of Hathorn and County Route 1, is Founders Day, which also has some demonstrations and other displays that are not quite the same as what we had last week, but still, once again, emphasizing the role that the town played in the Revolution. I would like to, once again, to commend our Town Historian, Sue Gardner. She's been doing a fantastic job with promoting everything that has been going on. She's doing a great job of coordinating things and making sure that everything is interesting and educational. I really can't say enough good things about her, she really stepped up to the occasion. Some towns aren't doing anything. It's like, oh, I don't know. Maybe we'll come to Warwick and see what they're doing. But it's been great so far. Looking forward to an eventful year.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER** - Thanks for your hard work on that, Russ.

**COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY** - Thank you, Supervisor Dwyer. The ribbon-cutting for the Mountain Store, which is a hometown outdoor lifestyle apparel shop located at 56 Main Street in Warwick, New York, is tomorrow, Friday, March 27th, starting at 4:00 p.m. The Warwick Valley Chamber will also have an after-hours mixer on Wednesday, April 8th, from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Candy Apple Shoppe, located at 60 Main Street in Warwick. COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. This Sunday, the Pine Island Firehouse is having a pancake breakfast. It starts at 7:30 a.m., until about noontime, 1 o'clock when they finish.

Also, I want to remind people that all the farmers are starting to plant now, so be careful driving through the area. Also, I know a lot of people are going to be out doing yard work. Right now, there is a statewide ban on burning for the next few weeks. It's always this time of year. Usually, it ends when the leaves start coming out of the trees. If you do want to burn any of your leaves, you still have to contact one of the local fire departments or the P.D. so they know.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Farms are exempt from that, right?

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - I believe so, but they still don't realize.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Obviously, you should be very cautious.

COUNCILMAN SHUBACK - Be very cautious this time of year because of the fact that without the leaves of the trees, it could spread through the woods really quick. That's why they wait until the leaves come out before they let you burn it.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you.

TOWN CLERK ASTORINO - We were supposed to have bid proposals for the roofs at Mountain Lake Park tonight, but we are going to hold off until the next meeting so we can review the submitted ones a little bit better.

I just want to let people know that we are working hard watching demos for the grant we are seeking to get to upgrade our records management system. We need to get all that situated before April 1st.

In addition, I wanted to point out, although the fire department was getting a presentation, Ms. Mosher had also mentioned firefighter Melissa Stevens. She is not only the president of the fire department, she is also one of my deputies and she really does always go beyond, she also does that in my office. I think the residents noticed. We actually had a delivery for her in my office this week, a beautiful bouquet because she went beyond to help somebody and that person just wanted to show their appreciation. It is nice to be recognized. Everybody in my office. Carolyn, Rebecca, they all do a great job and I just wanted them to know that I appreciate that. I can always depend on them.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER – You're correct. Everyone in your office does a great job, including you.**

**TOWN CLERK ASTORINO – Thank you.**

**SUPERVISOR DWYER - Greatly appreciated. Okay, my report. Earlier today, we had a meeting at town hall in this room with the new region director for the New York State DOT. Myself, Ben, the engineer, as well as the three mayors were invited to this meeting. It was an introductory meeting as she takes on a new role being our region director, and one of the big reasons we wanted to meet was because the Town of Warwick happens to have an incredible amount of infrastructure work going on over the next several years. In addition to the Route 94 and 17A paving project, we've got the Jayne Street Bridge happening. We've got the Longhouse Creek Bridge being planned shortly. We've got other right-of-way work that we're working on with the DOT. We've got a lot of big projects that are happening right now. It was a great introductory meeting. We got a lot of really good resources. We had a great conversation. What we also did was work on the next five-year plan that the New York State DOT looks to address within our region. Fortunately, we've got a few more roads that are being considered in the next five-year plan for the DOT for repaving, and that will essentially bring all of the New York State highways within the Town of Warwick fully repaved. A lot of good infrastructure projects happening, great communication, and a great meeting with the DOT today.**

**As you can tell if you've driven around the Town of Warwick in the last two weeks, you probably encountered some degree of traffic. We've been talking about it for a year now. We gave you a great notice that it was going to be happening, so please expect it. The one thing that I will say is as people are driving around town and they're looking for detours and looking for shortcuts, you're generally going to be driving through someone's neighborhood. You're going to be driving in denser populated areas with children present, with pets present. There was, I believe, a child hit yesterday by the Warwick Middle School. Our police are going to be out in full force, really strictly enforcing traffic rules, particularly when driving through neighborhoods. There will be a zero-tolerance policy and we don't care if you're a resident. If you're caught speeding or violating our traffic laws in local residential neighborhoods, you will be given a ticket. We are going to take this very seriously, so please plan ahead. We know it's inconvenient. I have to drive around town all day. Ben has to drive around town all day. The police department has to drive around town. Our first responders have to move throughout the town. We're all in the same struggle. We all have to plan accordingly, but please be very careful as you drive through the neighborhoods within our town.**

**Tonight, you're going to hear a resolution with Veregy Solutions. They are a company that is going to provide a no-cost, full, comprehensive energy audit for the Town of Warwick. As you've noticed, we like to have plans in place for everything that we do, whether it's parks, buildings, and even in the case of Energy Solutions. We want to have good plans so that we're prepared for when grant money comes available. We have shovel-ready projects and a good long-term, long-range plan that we can just go to, reference, and implement. Veregy**

Solutions is going to provide a comprehensive energy audit for the Town of Warwick and we're looking forward to getting to work with them.

The Town Board is going to consider an anti-soliciting law to address door-to-door knocking for commercial purposes. Over the last several years, it's been certainly brought to my attention, countless instances of random people going to people's doors, knocking on their doors, for various reasons. This is not something that we want to encourage. We want to discourage this. So, the Town of Warwick will be working on a law to prohibit commercial soliciting door-to-door operations throughout the Town of Warwick. We met with the local mayors. The Village of Greenwood Lake is already in progress of this situation. The Village of Warwick and the Village of Florida are also considering it as well. We want to make sure that people feel safe in their homes. They're not having random people. It's bad enough when politicians have to go door-to-door to knock on their door to solicit votes. We don't want to extend that to commercial businesses, random people knocking on doors to try to get services or whatever they may be looking to do.

I'm happy to report that the New York State Senate, led by Senator James Skoufis, who sponsored a bill for the Town of Warwick, did pass the New York State Senate yesterday. This is to amend the PDR law to allow us to use some of the funding for water quality improvement projects, which would include but not be limited to storm water management, cleaning up Glenmere Lake, cleaning up Wickham Lake, cleaning up Cascade Lake, cleaning up Greenwood Lake, and some of our other natural resources that we have in the Town of Warwick. So, we very much appreciate Senator Skoufis' effort in leading that fight. We're now working on the Assembly side, which the bill is sponsored by Assemblyman Karl Brabenec. I'll be traveling to Albany in the next couple of weeks to lobby that bill with the New York State Assembly.

I'm happy to announce that I am going to begin a new initiative of bringing all of our department heads as well as myself to a different location within the Town of Warwick every month. So, on a given Tuesday, the first one being April 14th. So, Tuesday, April 14th, myself as well as our 10 department heads will be at formerly Cafe a la Mode, which is now known as 1 Oakland Ave, and we'll be there at 9:00 a.m. having a cup of coffee, and we'll be talking about different projects and getting the department heads together so that they can meet each other and leverage resources to get stuff done, but it'll also be an opportunity for the public to join us and meet with each department head individually, collectively, they can listen to what we're talking about, they can join in on a conversation, and they can ask questions and better understand the services that we're providing for the town. So, the first one will be on April 14th at 9:00 a.m. at 1 Oakland, which is the former Cafe a la Mode. The next one will be in the month of May, and that will be in Pine Island. The next one will be in the month of June, and that will be in Florida, and then the one following that will be in Greenwood Lake, and we will be launching this on the town website. You'll see where we will be, and we hope the public joins us. So that's going to be a nice initiative to create more accessibility to all of our residents. And at this time, that concludes my report.

You know, your hard work is really adding up, and it's bringing a lot of value to us, so we really appreciate everything that you're doing.

**SUPERVISOR DWYER** - It is. Thank you.


