VISITING OFFICIALS:

Supervisor Dwyer introduced the Hon. Jonathan Redeker, Orange County Legislator, District 2.

HON. JONATHAN REDEKER – Orange County Legislator, District 2 – Board and guests and directors, it's nice to be with you. I wanted to come in and address the board in the newly elected term of the county legislature. Warwick was split into four districts.

The district that I am representing is basically Goshen, Florida, and a part of Warwick from Florida to the Town Park. It's great to hear about the Town Park stuff going on. It's a wonderful park. Great job over there in all that programming as well.

I wanted to just give a little bit about my background and my vision for the role I have as county legislator. I am new to politics but not new to government. I was a government teacher at Goshen High School for a long time. So much like I see the fine music and art teachers that you guys have here in Warwick doing those things, doing art and music, I feel like there's a nice trajectory from teaching government to being in the government. So, I think that's a neat thing for me to share with you. I also wanted to share that I do have some Warwick roots I live in Goshen now. I lived in Homestead Village when I was getting my feet set in Orange County about 21 years ago. It was a great opportunity. I lived in Homestead Village for a couple years. My wife was a teacher at Warwick Valley Middle School. That's what brought us to the area. So, an odd situation for many people to hear that it was work that brought us to Orange County. We need to get back to some of that as well for jobs and opportunities here in our region.

This is a great community. Warwick is, I think, one of the pinnacle communities in Orange County. I think you guys deserve a lot of credit for your hand at the wheel, doing both a lot of work in the large acreage that you guys have and the roads to take care of and the excellent police work, but in the community that you've built here, as far as sponsoring small businesses, having that idea of shopping local, being really connected to community.

And I think that beyond the natural beauty and landscape in this area, I think Warwick is a town that many people look at and say, wow, I wish it could be like that. So, kudos to you all in that. I do think it's a gem in the county.

One of the things that I need to be very careful of as county legislature is not to lump all of the three municipalities of Goshen, Florida, and Warwick together. There are obviously unique things about each place, and I'll handle that deftly and make sure that I work closely and transparently with all of you for anything that we need from the county that I can help provide. We just got our committee assignments, so I'm excited to be chairing the rules committee as well as being participants on lots of other different committees coming up this term so very excited about that. Anything that you need, I really build my life on honesty and trust. We want to make sure that we're being open and transparent, and the people deserve that. So, I'm looking forward to a great partnership long term, hopefully, and I'm ready to work with anybody through transparency and good governance on both sides of the aisle. Whether people support me or not, I'm here to work with you hand in hand, and I appreciate the time. So, thank you, Jesse.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - No problem. I appreciate you coming. Best of luck to you, and always feel free to reach out if you ever need anything. You want to sit down and have lunch, and now we talked about it at the senior barbecue. Maybe now we can get together and have lunch.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great. Thanks for coming.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER – Thank you Supervisor. I am pleased to present the 2025 State of the Police Department Report. This past year has been defined by progress, adaptability, and an unwavering commitment to protecting and serving the residents of the Town of Warwick. Our department continues to embrace professionalism, compassion and integrity as the foundation of our work.

The accomplishments of 2025 reflect the dedication of the men and women who serve our community whether on patrol, supporting emergency dispatch or working behind the scenes in administrative and investigative roles. Their efforts ensure that our town remains a safe and welcoming place to live, work, and visit.

Throughout the year, we strengthened community partnerships, expanded officer training, and leveraged modern technology to enhance both public safety and operational efficiency.

From responding to emergencies and enforcing the law, to engaging with youth, seniors, and civic organizations, our officers work tirelessly to maintain the high level of service our residents expect and deserve. Some of our activity highlights for 2025. We responded to 19,923 reported incidents. We effected 384 arrests, issued 2,026 traffic tickets, and 336 parking tickets. We investigated 657 motor vehicle accidents, which breaks down to 589 property damage, 66 personal injury, and 2 fatalities. We seized 77.21 grams of cocaine, 93.67 grams of heroin and fentanyl, 229 pills, 41.9 pounds of marijuana, 22.5 grams of mushrooms, and we either seized or recovered 76 firearms.

Our staffing in 2025. We have retirements, police officer and canine handler Kevin Halsey, along with canine Rocky, retired on June 28th. Rocky was Officer Halsey's third four-legged partner in his career. Officer Halsey was known throughout the county and the state as a role model for canine handlers. Detective Shawn Tetzlaff retired on August 16th. Detective Tetzlaff dedicated his career to serving the community and investigating and, in most cases, solving some of our most serious crimes.

Promotions. Officer Robert Kenney and Officer Joseph Kennedy were promoted to detective on May 29th. They have become valuable members of our investigative unit and provide much-needed support investigating criminal activity in our town. On a side note, when we promoted them on May 29th, we held a little gathering downstairs in the police station for their friends and family to congratulate them with our fellow officers. Before that event was over, Detective Brasier and Detective Kennedy were called out to a reported burglary. They investigated the burglary, identified the suspect almost immediately, and made an arrest. Detective Kennedy made an arrest within hours of his promotion for a felony burglary.

Some of the highlights for 2025. On February 15th, we were one of three agencies in Orange County to go live with the county's new records management system. This milestone culminated months of grant-funded technology upgrades to our patrol units, giving our officers the ability to process reports in the field in real time while connected to our communications center and the 911 center. By mid-2026, all agencies in Orange County will be operating on this system, enabling our officers to gather and share information instantaneously. This was a huge milestone for our department.

This is the first time since we were handwriting reports that we're taking reports in the field. I think to put it in perspective, when you're patrolling 105 square miles, when you're able to take reports on the scene and not have to come back to the station and type a report into the computer is huge for our operation. We're almost a year into it now, and it's really almost a seamless transition for us.

Our school officers held the seventh and eighth sessions of our Junior Police Academy over the summer, with a total of 47 young cadets from the ages of 10 to 15 successfully completing the program. This year, standout junior cadets from previous sessions who aged out were welcomed back as platoon leaders, serving as role models for our new recruits.

Our fourth National Night Out at Memorial Park in August brought not only the largest attendance from the community, but also the highest participation from our local stakeholders. This event highlighted the partnerships, the people, and the resources that make Warwick special. It included children's activities and live entertainment by the Black Dirt Bandits, that's a well-known local band.

We worked tirelessly with the New York State Police on the Dawn Marino 1981 cold case homicide. A multi-day search warrant was executed on Little York Road near the original discovery site, representing the most significant investigative progress in decades. This case remains active and ongoing, and we are committed to bringing long-awaited justice to the Marino family.

We met and, in many cases, exceeded the 112 standards of the New York State Police Accreditation Program that we first earned in 2023. These standards govern our operations, administrative practices, and training requirements, ensuring that we meet the highest benchmarks for a municipal police agency. We partnered closely with Orange County's newly established Arson Task Force, significantly increasing the quality and the depth of fire investigations in our jurisdiction. Five joint investigations were conducted in 2025. One involved a fatal residential structure fire, and the remaining four resulted in three separate arrests.

Our community outreach efforts continued, including car seat fittings, health and wellness fairs, the annual senior barbecue, career day at the Warwick High School, and presentations to our senior citizen groups on scams targeting older residents. In a year when breast cancer hit close to home, we united behind the efforts to raise awareness and fund research. Our officers wore pink ribbons for the month of October and raised nearly \$3,000 through No-Shave November. Our compassion and solidarity remain as strong as

our badge. As we conclude 2025, I want to express my sincere appreciation to the men and women of the Town of Warwick Police Department. Your commitment, professionalism, and resilience on the road, in dispatch, in investigations, and in every support, function continue to define this agency and serve our community with honor. I also extend heartfelt thanks to the Town Board for your ongoing leadership and support. Your investment in staffing, technology, equipment, and infrastructure ensures we have the tools necessary to keep Warwick safe. The accomplishments of the year reflect teamwork, shared purpose, and a collective belief in the value of public service. As we turn the page to 2026, the Town of Warwick Police Department remains fully committed to innovation, professionalism, and service excellence. We will build on the foundations strengthened in 2025, expanding training opportunities, investing in emergency technologies, and enhancing the health and wellness of our officers. We will continue recruiting and developing the next generation of police professionals, while deepening our partnerships with the residents, schools, businesses, and regional agencies. Our mission is clear – to protect our community, reduce harm, and ensure every person in Warwick feels safe, respected, and supported. We approach the coming year with confidence, purpose, and a renewed sense of duty. Together with the Town Board, our citizens, and our dedicated staff, we will make 2026 another year of progress and pride for the Town Board. That concludes my report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I just want to say thank you very much for all your hard work and leadership, Chief, and thank you very much to the men and women of our entire Warwick Police Department. You guys do a fantastic job. We're very proud of you, and we appreciate everything you do.

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER - We appreciate that. Thank you, sir.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO – Since our last meeting, we did have quite windy conditions a week and a half ago, we had quite a bit of storm damage to cleanup. We are out doing our winter work. We are brushing roadsides. We brushed Sanfordville Road and we are still continuing to finish that road.

Ryerson Road went out with our boom mower and Rutherford Road. Potholes, we were out filling daily with cold mix. Snow work, we did on 1/6, we sanded and salted all roads. Vehicle maintenance and emergency repairs, that's ongoing, especially in the winter. We did haul some material to the Greenwood Lake stock pile sand/salt mix and straight salt. Also, I would like to just mention the no parking on the streets during the winter, it makes our life a lot easier. It makes the plow drivers' life a lot easier if everybody can move their cars off the road. Thank you.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Good evening, everyone. I just have a couple things for tonight. We mailed out and went door-to-door and hand-delivered notices about the service line inventory program to all our water districts. We received several phone calls about the notices, so I just wanted to reiterate, this notice does not mean that the house has lead pipes. It means it is marked unknown on our inventory until we can fully identify all parts of the water service that's buried outside.

One of our goals for this year is to work towards hopefully getting some funding to assist in the state mandate. Other than that, we're doing a lot of new year and year-end things, year-end reporting for regulatory agencies, updating sampling schedules for all our districts, starting to work on annual water quality reports. Our guys finished all quarter four meter reads for last year, and our guys continue to do winter maintenance and upkeep at all the facilities, as well as doing the rounds and normal operations.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thank you, Supervisor. With the lack of snow on the ground, the pickleball players are back at the park, even though it's been cold. Which is great to see and there's lots of people out hiking and walking, which is also great to see in the winter.

The construction on the existing pools is still happening. They're working on coping around the pools. It's nice and smooth and not sharp and pointed, so it's great.

We have some great events coming up in the community. This Saturday, we have a free event called Too Good to Toss Mini Kids Event, where people donate clean and well-kept toys and clothing for children and toddlers. You don't have to donate something to come and take something. It's like a swap, so you could come and just take what you need. That's a free event on Saturday at the parks from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The following Saturday on January 24th is the Warwick Winter Wiggle. That's a really fun, free event. There's a dial-A-Bus available if you need to get there. There's food. There's a lot of mental health

awareness tables, there are crafts and things for the kids. That is on Saturday the 24th from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. That's going to be a really fun event. I hope you can all come out and make it.

Lastly, I just wanted to remind everybody to go on to the Town's Facebook page or go on to the town's website and take the Parks and Recreation Survey. It's a great survey. We had only about 230 people taking it. The feedback's been fantastic on our parks. I hope you join me and take that survey so we can get some more information about what you want to see in our parks.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - Okay, good evening. The Warwick Humane Society begins 2026 with a full house. They have 25 dogs, small and large mixes. They have 85 adult cats, 60 kittens, 16 rabbits, 4 roosters, and 2 budgies, which are parakeets, if you don't know what a budgie is. they have 189 homeless animals. Adoption applications are available at wvhumane.org under the forms and downloads tab. With the holidays behind us, it's a great time to adopt.

They have an extensive wish list, the cat and dog pill pockets. These are little treats that they put pills into so they would eat their medicine. ¼ pound paper food trays, pâté-style canned cat food, medium and large exam gloves, bleach, Simple Green cleaner, paper towels, small and large paper plates, 13-gallon garbage bags. They do not need any newspapers at this time.

They want to thank the Town Board, the DPW, Warwick Police, the Fire and EMS, and the community for the support of the organization's efforts for our community's homeless pets. That's all they have for the Humane Society.

As far as the Town of Warwick Friendly Visitor Program goes, for the month of December, the number of neighbors assisted was 32. The number of volunteers assisting those neighbors was 27. The total number of services provided by volunteers was 246. The total for the year, the volunteers provided 2,194 services. That's all I have. Thank you.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL – Well, now we're into 2026, which is our 250th anniversary. There's a lot of things going on all over the town in the next few months. And the best place to look these things up is to go to the library website, which was a library website, Historical Society. Check on the town website. We'll have a few things going on then.

This Monday is Martin Luther King Day. I hope that people will—I always thought one of the most profound things he ever said was, you know, the color of the skin is not as important as the character. I'm paraphrasing, but, you know, you can't—character over color of skin. I hope we can, in the future, try to get up to that standard and judge people on who they are and not what they are.

We're going to have a battery meeting next week. We're proceeding with the Town Board's direction on the new battery ordinance in the town. We're doing our due diligence with that and doing research. The Planning Board Chairman is working with us with the

engineers and attorneys, and we're going to try to craft the best ordinance that we can for the town for the best interest. That's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great. The Town Clerk is not feeling well tonight or the last couple of days, so I do appreciate the Deputy Clerk stepping in. I'm sure Eileen is watching from home right now, thinking that you're doing a fabulous job. Great work, and we appreciate it. My report is somewhat of a summary of our workshop. We have about an hour-long workshop before the meeting that's always open to the public, and I'll just mention some of the highlights to the public.

Two major projects that we're working on right now that are both significantly grant-funded projects, the Wickham Wastewater District project as well as the Jayne Street Bridge project are fully underway as far as design. We intend to begin construction on the Wickham Wastewater probably late 2027. We're going to go out to bid hopefully by the end of this year, and it is a significant project that will require a lot of outreaches to try to get the best and most competitive pricing.

The Jayne Street Bridge, we're working on the design. We've been working on the design for about six months, but unfortunately for us, it is a state-funded project, which requires much more thorough review and state involvement, so it's not a very simple process like it would be if the town were funding 100 percent of the project.

We are actively working with the Village of Warwick on our multi-use trail, which will connect the downtown Village of Warwick with the Route 94 commercial district of Price Chopper and ShopRite. We had a conference call this week with the engineering firm, and we've basically finalized the details of the map, which will be made public very soon. Right now, we're going to be working with each of the property owners that are abutting the trail and looking at potential easement acquisitions as certain portions of the trail will run into private property, but we've already met with all the stakeholders in the area along the entire path of the trail, and every one of them are very supportive of this project, and we hope that it will be very similar to the county's trail system that they have, which has become a widely-used, multi-use trail, and this will be a wonderful recreation trail, but will also connect residents to places where they may work without having vehicular access.

In addition to that trail, we're also working, the Town Board and I talked today with the recreation director, about submitting a grant application for trail improvements at Wickham Woodlands Park. This would also include the State School Road portion of the roadway there. That's a very narrow section, but with the opening of Wickham Woodlands Park, this has become a widely-traveled pathway for a lot of people that are looking to exercise and just see nature. So, we're going to apply for some grant funding to expand the trail network at Wickham Woodlands Park.

The Town of Warwick is partnering with each of our villages to implement a transportation safety action plan. This plan has been in the works for a little over a year, and we're going to introduce it to the public starting on January 29th. We're going to have a public forum right here in town hall at 6:00 p.m. on January 29th. I encourage anyone who's interested in slowing down traffic, creating better transportation networks for pedestrians to attend this meeting. Give us your feedback, and we'll try to incorporate it in the transportation safety action plan as best we can.

As Councilman Kowal mentioned, we are planning to continue our battery storage facility committee meeting. Obviously, we had several fires in 2023. We had two of them, and a moratorium was put into place immediately after those fires. We took a little bit of time. We wanted to see technology improve. We felt that the technology had improved a little bit, so we felt a little comfortable reengaging the process and looking at eliminating our moratorium and actually having a solid law that made sense for the Town of Warwick, which would have allowed battery storage facilities. In light of the fire that recently took place, I think we have all come to the conclusion that we're going to reconsider that and reevaluate our steps forward. It seems quite irresponsible for us to move in a direction that would allow large-scale battery storage facilities to be constructed in the Town of Warwick in light of a recent fire. We understand that this is relatively new technology that needs to continue developing, but our main priority in the Town of Warwick is public safety and public health, and that's what we're going to prioritize as we move forward. So, we're not going to shut the door on the conversation. We will continue to have committee meetings, which is not only made up of the councilmen as well as myself, our DPW, our engineer, but it's also made up of members of the public, some of whom in the audience tonight, and it is made up of NYSERDA, who are the main organizations within the state that is driving this battery storage need. As New York State looks to electrify more of our homes and more of our assets, battery storage has become a main thing that they're relying on. So, we understand the need. We also have to understand and prioritize public safety and public health. So, we're not going to walk through this process with closed eyes. We're going to continue in a very thorough manner. So, more will come out on that.

I did want to address the recent fire and just update the public that, from my perspective, in my opinion, the Village of Warwick is handling the situation very steady and holding Convergent very accountable for the actions that took place during our recent fire. I cannot get into detail about exactly what they're doing, but I do know that they have condemned the site. It did not have a legal CO to operate, so they opened the site and energized it without legal authority to do so, and the Village of Warwick is holding them

accountable. So, as we monitor that situation and keep an eye on what's going on, I'm very confident that the Village of Warwick is addressing this as needed.

A couple of updates on PDR, as I've shared with the board. Right now, we've got 160 acres that are pending closure. They're already in contract. All the funding has been approved, and we're just finalizing details with the federal government to get this completed. Those should be completed by late spring, and we've got approximately 500 acres that are currently in contract to be preserved this year alone. So, we're working very hard to continue the tradition of preserving open space and active farmland within the Town of Warwick, and we will make every effort possible to ensure that we're preserving the character of our town. At this time, that concludes my report, and I will open it up to privilege of the floor on any agenda item.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR (GENERAL):

MICHAEL HELME & KATE DEBOLD - Thank you. I'm Michael Helme and this is Kate Boyd. We're both steering committee members to Sustainable Warwick. We're pleased to announce that we are launching the survey Waste Not Want Not survey. We appreciate the help of the Town in developing it and all three villages, as well as the library, to help distribute it. We certainly appreciate that. I also want to thank Kate and Theresa Valhais from the library and Fred Romler from the Greenwood Lake Lions who contributed to developing the survey. We really would prefer that people take it online. We do have a few printed copies, but hopefully there will be lots of places to find the link online. You'll be able to find it on the Sustainable Warwick homepage soon. I guess the main thing I want to say is that I think the way we've written the survey, as participants go through, they will be able to have lots of opportunities to reduce the waste, maybe save money or help somebody else out. And at the same time, I think the Town and other organizations around Town will be able to learn about how well our program is understood in Warwick Valley. Lastly, it only takes about five minutes to fill in the survey. So, my big hope is that the Waste Not survey will not be a waste of time. Kate, is there anything you'd like to add?

KATE DEBOLD - It's super simple, as Michael was saying. It's 25 questions. It will take you maybe two minutes, unless you stop and dwell and take a little bit longer. It is anonymous. We wanted to emphasize that. It's for residents of the Town, each of the

villages, but also non-residents. So, folks who come to Town and work here but live elsewhere, we're anxious for them to be aware of what's here, each of the programs. But also, thanks to the Town's input, we're asking about a potential composting program. We're also asking about potential dual-stream waste recycling. So, there's an opportunity for folks to weigh in on potential programs as well. So, we're really pleased you're launching that.

MICHAEL HELME - Also, the Climate Spark community will get a couple points for having done the survey. Then, on another topic, I'm putting on my Transformation Trails hat. On Monday, our group had been looking for a way to get topsoil and seeds to do a project out of the Transformation Trails. On Wednesday, Jeff Zahn reported, I'm calling the company, and they're not returning my calls or anything. Then, in the middle of Tuesday, he said, wait a minute, they're going to donate the soil. Then, five minutes later, he was saying, they're delivering it already. So early morning, Ben had no idea. He'd had so much excitement on Wednesday. Got it early morning, and by one o'clock, he had his man in the backhoe out to do the work, spreading the soil. We had volunteers there. I especially want to thank; besides all the DPW workers, Alana Heller has really done a great job of looking at this and saying, oh, this would be a great place to plant this meadow. We've also had it reviewed by Marcy Danker, the landscape designer. Jeff Zahn, Geoff Howard, of course, and dropping in early, he was there, Sal Grecco, Arnold Villa, Greg Lucio, a lot of us were out there getting our exercise, prepping the soil. So, we really appreciate the support of the DPW staff. Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great, thank you, Michael. We really appreciate it. The landscape architect you mentioned before, Marcy?

MICHAEL HELME - Marcy Danker.


SUPERVISOR DWYER - Can you get me her contact info? We're interviewing landscape architects next week, and I would like to see if she's interested in helping with that.

MICHAEL HELME - Yes, I will.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Okay, great. And thank you for your hard work, and Kate as well, putting together this Waste Not Survey. I think it's really great information. It will help educate the public. It will give the Town Board a lot of information about what our residents are looking for, what they know about our existing programs, and I really think it's a great way to spread the word and learn a little bit more about what we can do better in the town. So, thank you very much for your hard work on that.

NEXT MEETING: SUPERVISOR DWYER - The next Town Board Meeting will be Thursday, January 29th, 2026. and just a point of note, this is a 1 p.m. meeting. It is a daytime meeting. Because there was a large gap between this and the next meeting, we wanted to be able to adopt a resolution to pay our bills. We could still have a workshop as early as 11:30 a.m. Each are open to the public.
