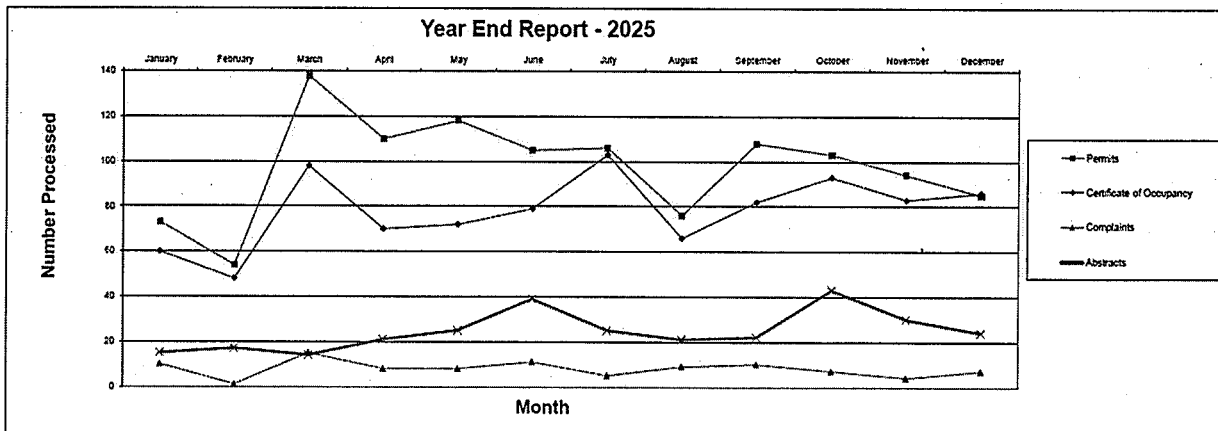

VISITING OFFICIALS: There were no elected officials present.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF, JOHN RADER – Thank you, Mr. Supervisor. I just have a brief report for this meeting. I want to talk about the storm this past weekend, which I'm sure every reporter has said something about the storm. Prior to the storm, the Supervisor of the town and the police department and the village have helped. We did a good job putting warnings out there to people through social media, through the grid alert system, and trying to get the

message out about getting the roads clear, prepared for the storm, not being out there on that day. I also want to commend Lieutenant Morley for the amount of effort that he put in to prepare the town and the three villages, the warming stations, and being prepared that if the storm got worse and we started losing power, and people needed places to go, that was all that happened then. So, it was a great plan going into the storm. I believe the word getting out about no parking on the street made a difference between the town and the three villages. Which tells us that this can be done every storm. We don't have to wait for predictions of up to two feet to make sure the cars are clear. I don't have a tally yet of how many calls we responded to, but I will tell you we were able to respond to every call, and that's due to the great work of the state, county, town, and village DPWs. Ben, please tell your employees what a fantastic job they did. We can't respond to calls without them. This isn't an us-and-them situation. This is a partnership with emergency services and the DPW.

We cannot navigate these roads unless they're out there taking the first risks of getting them clear, and they did an absolutely amazing job. I will say post-storm, it was a little disappointing to see the amount of snow that's been deposited on the road, from driveways, business parking lots, and everything, and I will say going forward, we will keep taking the hard stance that we took on this storm about parking enforcement. If we cannot locate the owners of the cars, we will have no choice but to impound vehicles, and I will be directing our officers that any snow that's been deposited back on the road after they've cleared them, we will be taking enforcement action, whether it's the homeowner or private contractors doing it. So, if snow ends up out there while they're clearing the driveways, we get it, it's a lot, they have an obligation to keep the roads clear. So, we have our commitment on that as well, that we will enforce that. Finally, I would just like to read a letter that I received addressed to Lieutenant Morley about Detective Brasier.

I just wanted to contact you regarding the response your officers had this past Sunday, January 17th, to my relative's home in Pine Island. The one officer in particular, Officer Jason Brasier, went above and beyond to not only help, but console my aunt during a very traumatic incident involving my uncle, Jim Doyle, who unfortunately passed away basically in front of our eyes. Officer Brasier remained professional as well as sympathetic to all of us as we arrived at the home. Officer Brasier exemplifies what being a police officer is all about, putting others before yourself. In this instance, it was simply just being compassionate. In this day and world, we currently live in, where everyone and anyone seems to go out of their way to try and find any law enforcement officer wrongdoings, I want to take the time to show my appreciation and gratitude towards this officer. Thank you, Police Officer Brasier, and thank you to the moral people. That's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great job, Chief, and the department did a wonderful job leading up to the storm. Great communication with me, great communication with our partners, with Ben, I know. It was really top-notch, everything all around. I know Lieutenant Slesinski was involved, and you were involved, and Lieutenant Morley was involved, and a lot of people were involved in the preparation for the storm, so it was nice to see everything play out the way that we wanted it to. Great job.

POLICE CHIEF, JOHN RADER - Thank you.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO – I just want to comment on Chief Rader's report, without the cooperation and commitment from the department, it was unbelievable what you guys accomplished. It made our lives so much easier when it came to it, and the men and women down there, it made a huge, huge difference for us. With the Town Supervisor, I know we had calls all before. There was no question about it, and the commitment from the department was out of this world. Thank you. We've had quite a winter so far, and I will comment on the men and women of DPW that there is no quit in any of them. They've all come in. They're there from the first flake to the last flake and then back again, and as Chief Rader pointed out, it's nice when you could finish up and the roads are clear, but when residents decide to throw more snow back in the road, they make dangerous situations for people driving in the narrow roads as it is. So, thank you again. We can act on that. That makes a big difference. It's costly. It's overtime. Again, they come back and we clear the roads, but the men and women of DPW are at the top. I think you all know that. So, I just wanted to point out that we did have the storms on the 16th and 17th, this last one, the 23rd and 24th. We are up in Kings Estates as we speak, clearing the snow. We had one more day up there.

We came in to do the Village of Greenwood Lake at 8 p.m. Tuesday night. We worked until 2 a.m. to clear the main street in Greenwood Lake. That worked out very well. We are also replacing mailboxes as needed, which in these storms is quite a lot. I think Town of Warwick is probably one of the few municipalities in Orange County that still does that, so the residents here should thank all of you for that because I don't think the county or many municipalities do that at all. So, our Anthony Mann is out there constantly putting up mailboxes. We are hauling material to the Greenwood Lake stockpile, some salt and sand salt mix.

We did get Mattie in with the water plants. We got them all plowed out and taken care of. And as always, we'll be here for the next one. Any questions?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Any questions for Ben? Ben, I appreciate your hard work. You know, it's funny. You don't get paid any extra, but you're there every minute with those guys, which I think was 36 hours straight.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - I think both weekends I think we put in quite a few hours.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Yeah, it was quite a bit. It'll be a big payroll period for us. But, you know, there's certain things that we have no choice but doing, and that's one of them. So, I appreciate your hard work slugging through that storm.

DPW COMMISSIONER, BENJAMIN ASTORINO - As Chief Rader said, it's a team effort.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Yeah, it's great collaboration.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATTHEW MCPHERSON – Good afternoon, everyone. More on the snow. Water and wastewater plants luckily survived the

snowstorm mostly unscathed. We had a lot of help from Ben and Wally getting them all plowed out and getting paths dug and everything, so that really helped us.

But we didn't have as much as an emergency generator running through the storm, which is pretty incredible. Everything got dug out. Like I said, Wally was a huge help to us.

They salted everything they had dug out, so it worked out well. We started digging out some of the fire hydrants in Wickham Village. It's going to take us some time to get them all unburied. Once Wickham Village is done, we'll continue on to Greenwood Lake and the other water districts to get them all unburied. The main wastewater plant worked mostly well. We had one piece of equipment go down due to the snow and ice, but we were lucky.

Me and the guys were able to get it back up and running in minimal downtime. Other than that, we continue monitoring all the water plants, pump stations, and wastewater plants seven days a week. We perform preventive maintenance at all the facilities for the month of January. Collected and submitted all water and wastewater sampling for the month of January, as well as regular work to do with it.

RECREATION DIRECTOR, SAM WALTER – Thank you, Supervisor. My report's mainly about Mountain Lake Park. It looks like a winter wonderland over there now. No pickleballers are out playing, of course, but we do have folks coming and walking the loop around the park, and that's being teamed by DPW workers Butch and Keith. They did a great job with the storm and keeping up with maintaining the parking lots and all access to the buildings, which we need because they're used.

The winter wiggle got postponed with the extreme cold temperatures and the state of emergency, and we're working on finding a new date for it. I'll let you know when I have that date. Construction on the pools is at a halt because of all the snow. But in the office, we're doing a lot of work getting ready for the pools. So, we're getting some feedback on the Parks and Recreation Survey that people would like to see more swim lessons, lap swimming, maybe some aqua fitness classes. So, programming the pools, taking up a lot of time right now. Last summer, we had 88 spots for swim lessons. This summer, we'll have 126 spots for swim lessons with a couple of overflow classes as well. Those sign-ups will be April 1st. We'll keep you posted on how to do that when we get that info for you and membership for the pools will also be April 1st as well. I'm working with the Clerk on that. Lastly, just want to encourage everybody to take the Parks and Recreation Survey that's out now. I think it closes March 1st, so we still have time to take it. We have about 270 residents that took it. It's great information. It only takes a few minutes to take it. So, if you already took it, tell your friends to take it. Just spread the word to take the Parks and Rec Survey for us. Thank you. That's it.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - In the past two weeks, the Animal Control has responded to two human welfare checks with persons deceased in the home and the animals removed to the shelter. One was a single, small female dog. The other, a very elderly dog and cat. Animal Control returned to the one home repeatedly for another cat and finally captured the cat on Wednesday. Two days ago, a person came to the shelter with a cat with his head

stuck in a soup can. They successfully removed the can, and the cat is recovering at the shelter.

Despite the recent snowstorm, a few staff and volunteers made it to the shelter to care for the animals both days in the storm. They want to give thanks to the DPW for plowing the driveway and to Mike Wettstein for volunteering to use the snowblower, creating pathways that were needed. The shelter animals are cared for 365 days a year, no matter the weather or the holiday. They wanted to give this reminder to pet owners. Keep your dogs' walks short. The ice melt and salt are painful to their paws. Dogs should not be tied outside in the winter for longer than it takes them to do their business. Dog houses must be insulated and sized properly for the breed of the dog, facing away from the north and raised off the ground with straw for bedding, not blankets which hold the cold and wetness. Better yet, bring them inside. They ask you to check the water bowls frequently to avoid frozen water and report a lost pet immediately to the shelter and your local police. These low temperatures are dangerous for people and pets. It's too cold for humans. It's too cold for pets. Due to caring for several senior pets at this time, donations to the Riley Fund would be greatly appreciated. Visit wvhumane.org or call the shelter at 845-986-2473.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Thank you. First, I'd like to commend DPW and the other snowplows. We live on a county road, but they also did a very good job as well. They did not get our mailbox, but even if they do, we have to pay for it. County doesn't pay for your mailbox if they hit it. We had a meeting via Zoom because of the weather on Sunday with the Friends of Hathorn. We made our plans for the spring and summer events. Keep an eye out on the Friends of Hathorn website. Starting in March, they're going to have some displays down at the Visitor Center in Sterling Forest. March 21st is going to be Warwick Day. We're going to have reenactors, displays at different points in history. I've been asked to take the chain link down there for a display on March 1st. It will be there for the entire month, and we're going to have a special display for it on the 21st with people there knowledgeable about the link and all that it entails. I'm going to start looking this week at our local music schools, starting with them. For the 4th of July parade, we thought we could have a small float commemorating General Hathorn and maybe a small pipe and drum corps. We can get some local youngsters to volunteer. We'll spring for the Tri-Corner Hats, and they have to learn how to play the pipe and or drums. That's all I have for now.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - Thank you, Supervisor. In the Village of Warwick for the Warwick Chamber of Commerce, there'll be a ribbon cutting for the Village Acorn, 29 Main Street, Warwick, New York, on Friday, January 30th at 4:00 p.m. That's tomorrow. Mount Peter celebrates 90 years, as previously mentioned. Saturday, that's the 31st. From 11:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m., 51 Old Mount Peter Road in Warwick. Live entertainment by the Black Dirt Bandits, roaming performers with magic balloons stilt walking, and more.

9. ALL ORANGE COUNTY DMV'S WILL BE TEMPORARILY CLOSED FOR THE NEW STATE LICENSING MODERNIZATION PROGRAM.

The Orange County Department of Motor Vehicle offices will be closed beginning Thursday, February 12th, 2026 (President's Holiday) and is tentatively scheduled to reopen on Wednesday February 18, 2026, at 9:00am. I encourage residents to make necessary arrangements in advance due to the upcoming NY Statewide DMV closure.

The NYS DMV will be implementing the new Licensing DRIVES application. During this time, all DMV transactions, including in-person, online and telephone services, will be temporarily unavailable while the large-scale system is upgraded and completed. The office will reopen to the public as soon as the State confirms system readiness and we will continue to communicate any changes to the reopening schedule.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - I would like to thank and commend Laura Barca, as well as the town clerk, for your help in coordinating the bid process. This was not a routine bid request that we did. We basically bid out almost every service that we receive and, in some areas, we actually saved quite a bit of money by going through this process. So, thank you both for your assistance in doing this. Attorney Krahulik, do you have anything that you would like to report?

ATTORNEY ROBERT KRAHULIK – Attorney for The Town – Sure. The only matters outside the ordinary course of town business would be number one on my list, a demand for payment on account of damages caused by Jorrey Construction up at Mountain Lake Park has been made. In the course of excavation, they disturbed an electrical line, which caused quite a bit of damage to town property. We made a demand for payment. I will report back to the board after a little progress is made on that matter. Number two, we continue to prosecute a number of short-term rental code violations, as well as zoning code violations, cases in the Town Justice Court with great success. Then finally, I can report that I am participating on a town battery electrical storage code revision committee with a look at town code revisions that will limit the size and nature of the battery electrical storage facilities that can be maintained here in Warwick with the hope of avoiding the fires that we witnessed down at the Warwick Middle School property and more recently in the Village of Warwick. That's all I have to report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - My report is going to be relatively brief for today. One thing I do want to report on is that the Water Department is actively going door to door in the Pine Island Water District to complete an income survey. This is a similar survey that we undertook in the Wickham Wastewater District, which ultimately brought us in grant funding upwards of \$8 million and interest-free financing for the remainder. So, this has proven to be extremely successful in securing grant funding, if not grant funding, low to no interest loans for whatever project we need to do. The Pine Island Water District is a very small district with 27 households. It requires a lot of work, and it is extremely difficult to do the work that is needed there and put the cost of all that work on the 27 households that live there. The income survey will be due March 1st, and the Water Department is actively going door to door so that they can interact with each of the residents. It obviously created a lot of

confusion when we just sent the mailer out. It's always better when you can do face-to-face interaction with people when you're asking them for sensitive information, which, by the way, is confidential, and it is generalized and not specifically determined where, you know, which household makes what. That information is kept and maintained confidential. So, we appreciate the Water Department doing that, and we really would appreciate if the public in the Pine Island Water District would cooperate with this. We need to hit a certain percent, which I think is 60%, greater than 60% in order to have a legitimate income survey. So, we need to get 60% of those households to qualify in order to get this done.

Next, we have a Transportation Safety Action Plan Public Forum this evening right in this room at 6:00 p.m. tonight. So, January 29th at 6:00 p.m., we're doing a Transportation Safety Action Plan Public Forum where we will introduce this process and plan to the public and start to get stakeholder feedback on what we're trying to do and what we can do to improve crash reduction and pedestrian safety measures throughout the Town of Warwick. We hope that the public will attend tonight's meeting. It will be livestreamed, so we will make sure that the meeting is available to the public if you cannot make it, and we hope to have good participation.

Now, as for the snowstorm, we heard from a lot of those who were involved in the snowstorm cleanup and management during the snowstorm. It took a lot of partners, not only those in this room, but Orange County DPW, the village DPWs of the Village of Warwick, Village of Florida, the Parks Department, and the Village of Greenwood Lake, just in the Town of Warwick. The State DOT had a very difficult job going over those two mountains and cleaning up their portion. We had the best preparation I think you could ever have for a snow event, and that was with the single purpose of making sure that people stayed safe, and we were able to do that effectively because of the coordination that we have and the teamwork across all departments. The DPW, as I said, you guys were up countless hours, and then the following night, working overnight, supporting the Village of Warwick and offering support to every other municipality within the town, really extending our resources to make sure that we're all covered and we're all looking out for each other. But you guys worked really hard. The police department, as always, we can always count on you. You know the residents count on you, and as a first responder myself, I counted on you. One of the things that was interesting during the snowstorm on Saturday night or Sunday night, during the snowstorm at about 6 o'clock, I happened to be riding for Greenwood Lake Ambulance, and I show up to the scene in the Greenwood Lake District, and I pull up to a long driveway, and there is a police officer shoveling faster than anyone I've ever seen shoveling in my life. He's shoveling a two-foot section of the driveway just to make sure that the responding ambulance could have access to the patient and able to transport the patient out. It was an act that I don't think we see very often, but I know that it happens often, and it was a great experience for me to see firsthand one of our police officers doing what we would hope they do, but certainly not what they're expected to do. So, I believe that this officer, Officer Mike Mazzella, went above and beyond in his duties that night, and I don't even know if he knew that I was the one that was responding in the ambulance. I know that he did not know that I was responding before he decided to shovel. He would have done it for any responding ambulance, and I think it's a great example to set for other officers, and

I know that that comes from you guys and the leadership within the department, and it also comes from a great work ethic and a great person. So, I want to commend Officer Mike Mazzella and the entire Warwick Police Department because I know each of you would do the same thing, but he happened to be the one that got caught doing it, but we really appreciate what he did. I appreciate it, and the dispatchers, their constant communication throughout the storm, our building and grounds employee here took care of the storms, the property in front of the Police Department, the Dial-a-Bus in Town Hall, single-handedly, I think, working all through the night, so great coordination. We did have a state of emergency, and it really proved why we did that, the cooperation with the public listening to the state of emergency, avoiding parking on the roads, avoiding using the roads unless absolutely necessary, was absolutely vital in making sure the first responders and the DPW crews could do their work to keep everybody safe and make sure that we had a good, quick cleanup for the next day. So, you know, this is not our first snowstorm, but what's funny is we haven't seemed to have had one in a really long time, so I think we're all kind of getting used to sunny days and global warming or whatever you want to call it. It was a good example of what can really happen when everybody, you know, gets back into the groove and does what they can do. Great work all around, and that concludes my report.

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of State Local Government Efficiency Grants Program provides funding to municipalities to promote efficiency, reduce costs, and enhance the delivery of local government services; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Warwick recognizes the need to explore innovative shared service opportunities to improve municipal operations and achieve cost savings; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Warwick, in partnership with the Village of Warwick, the Village of Greenwood Lake, and the Village of Florida, seek to conduct a comprehensive feasibility study to determine the viability of establishing a shared Police Department to serve all participating municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the proposed study will involve hiring a qualified consultant to:

1. Conduct a needs assessment for Police services across all participating municipalities.
2. Evaluate the feasibility of a Police Chief and/or department, including an analysis of potential cost savings, operational efficiency, and service delivery.

3. Examine possible structures for the shared service.
4. Outline the Police responsibilities to be shared, identify potential benefits of collaboration, and develop a framework for implementation.
5. Research and analyze best practices from other communities that successfully share Police services.

WHEREAS, the New York State Department of State will fund up to 50% of the total project cost and requires a local match of at least 50% of the total project cost; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Warwick is requesting an amount up to but not to exceed \$80,000 and is committed to funding an equal amount up to but not to exceed \$80,000 (50%) through local funds.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Warwick hereby declares its intention to submit an application as the lead applicant for the New York State Department of State Local Government Efficiency Grants Program to fund a feasibility study for the shared Police Services initiative; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Warwick commits to collaborating with the Village of Warwick, the Village of Greenwood Lake and Village of Florida in the application process and throughout the study to ensure its success; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Warwick will take all necessary steps to engage stakeholders, provide information, and support the implementation of this study to determine the feasibility and structure of sharing Police services among the participating municipalities.

The Town of Warwick further objects to discrimination in the sale, rental, leasing, financing of housing or land to be used for construction of housing, or in the provision of brokerage services because of race,

color, religion, ancestry, sex, national origin, handicap or disability as prohibited by Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968 (Federal Fair Housing Law) and the New York State Human Rights Law. Therefore, the Municipal Council of Town of Warwick does hereby approve the following resolution.

BE IT RESOLVED, that within available resources, the Town of Warwick will assist all persons who feel they have been discriminated against under one of the aforementioned categories, to seek equity under federal and state laws by filing a complaint with the New York State Human Rights Law and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, as appropriate.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Town of Warwick shall publicize this resolution and through this publicity shall cause owners of real estate, developers, and builders to become aware of their respective responsibilities and rights under the Federal Fair Housing Law, the New York State Human Rights Law, and any local laws or ordinances.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the municipality will at a minimum include, but not be limited to: (1) the printing and publicizing of this resolution, a fair housing public notice and other applicable fair housing information through local media, community contacts and placement on the Municipal website and in other social media; (2) distribution of posters, flyers, and any other means which will bring to the attention of those affected, the knowledge of their respective responsibilities and rights concerning equal opportunity in housing.

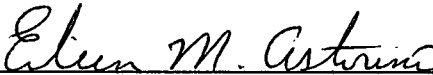
