The Repair Café –(a fix it for free program held at the Warwick Senior Center on the third Saturday of every OTHER month) requests permission to display a professionally-made sign, similar in size to the Warwick Fire Dept. Carnival sign, in front of the Town Hall parking lot.

We would like to put the sign in place 2 weeks prior to every Repair Café event and take the sign down after the event is over. We are a not-for-profit, all volunteer-run group. We request that the “sign permit fee” be waived.

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) staff have reviewed the Town of Warwick's State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) Lead Agency coordination, including the Short Environmental Assessment Form (EAF), and plan entitled "Pulpit Rock Inn," sheet 1 of 1, dated 05/29/19. The project involves the construction of a 7,853-square-foot (sq. ft.) 62-unit hotel, six 2,236-sq.-ft. eight-unit cottages and other site improvements. The DEC has no objection to the Town assuming Lead Agency and we offer the following comments:

The Town has preliminarily determined that the proposed project is an 'Unlisted' action, however pursuant to 6 NYCRR Part 617.4(b)(8), "any unlisted action occurring wholly or partially within an agricultural district," is considered a 'Type 1' action. The project is located within Agricultural District 2 therefore, this project appears to be a 'Type 1' action and a Full EAF must be provided.

STATE POLLUTION DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM (SPDES)

A SPDES permit is required for a facility whose treatment system has a design flow of total discharges to ground or surface waters of more than 1,000 gallons per day (gpd) of sewage-wastewater.

It appears that the overall project will disturb over one acre of land therefore, the project sponsor must obtain coverage under the current SPDES General Permit (GP-0-15-002) for Stormwater Discharge from Construction Activities, and a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) must be developed which conforms to requirements of the General Permit. As this site is within a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) community, the Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) must be reviewed and accepted by the municipality, and the MS4 Acceptance Form submitted with the SWPPP and the application for coverage, in accordance with the application instructions.



WATER WITHDRAWAL

Please note that an Article 15 Water Withdrawal permit may be required to undertake activities pursuant to 6NYCRR Part 601.6, such as the construction, operation and maintenance of a water withdrawal system. Please be aware that wells with the capacity to withdraw more than 100,000 gallons per day (gpd) is determined by the limiting maximum capacity of the water withdrawal system, and not the demand of the system (6NYCRR Part 601.6c). Please see the following link of the DEC's website for additional information: <https://www.dec.ny.gov/lands/55509.html>.

FRESHWATER WETLANDS

It appears that the subject property contains wetlands that are of size and quality to be eligible for inclusion on the state regulatory maps for Freshwater Wetlands. These wetlands need to be evaluated by a DEC biologist to determine if they are of sufficient size to be included on the state maps. In similar circumstances, the Department has worked with project sponsors to achieve an acceptable development consistent with the state regulatory permit standards (6 NYCRR Part 663) without being delayed by the formal process of adding a wetland to the state map.

It is unclear from the plan if the proposed project requires disturbance to the wetland. Please contact Michael Fraatz, NYSDEC Bureau of Ecosystem Health to schedule a site visit to confirm that the wetlands meet the criteria to be regulated and are accurately represented on the plans. After confirmation that the wetland meets the size criteria to be regulated, the Department can also discuss potential ways to minimize disturbance within 100 feet of the wetland. An Army Corps of Engineers permit may be required pursuant to Section 404 of the Clean Water Act. If a Section 404 permit is required, you will also require a Water Quality Certification pursuant to Section 401 of the Clean Water Act. Issuance of these certifications in NYS has been delegated to the DEC. Please contact the Army Corps of Engineers in New York City, at 917-790-8411, for any permitting they might require.

PROTECTION OF WATERS

A Protection of Waters permit is required to physically disturb the bed or banks (up to 50 feet from stream) of any streams identified above as "protected." A time restriction may be required for protection of cold-water trout fisheries (waters classified under Article 15 of the Environmental Conservation Law (ECL) with a "T" or "TS" designation), beginning October 1 and ending April 30.

If a permit is not required, please note, the project sponsor is still responsible for ensuring that work shall not pollute any stream or waterbody. We are in receipt of your letter dated May 20, 2019 in response for our request to use Town roads for BRAKING AIDS® Ride on Sunday, September 15, 2019.

BRAKING AIDS® Ride, now in its 17th year (but first in Warwick) is a three-day non-competitive event from Cooperstown to New York City. It is a small event in numbers; we expect approximately 90 riders this year. It encompasses over 300 miles and over 60 jurisdictions.

As you may imagine, with an event of this complexity, conflicts with other events inevitably arise. Unfortunately, we are unable to change the date of our ride, as it would simply create other conflicts elsewhere. That said, it is not uncommon for us to encounter other cycling events on our route. We understand the concern for safety and of the challenges that may occur when two rides occur on the same day. We have extensive experience in working with other rides to ensure that everyone – the riders, event directors and the Towns – have a positive, safe experience.

Before responding to your May 20 letter, we wanted to take the time to connect with the Orange County Bicycle Club, learn where their routes and rest stops are located, and rescout our route to minimize interactions between the two routes. That is the reason for the delay in resubmitting our application. The enclosed maps and cues reflect our new route after consultation with OCBC. Our new route is simpler and avoids most overlap with the Country Roads ride in Warwick.

On our revised route, there are only two potential interactions between the two routes in Warwick:

- Pine Island Turnpike-Little Brooklyn Road (1.0 mile overlap with Country Roads’ 25-mile route ONLY – not the 10-, 40- or 62-mile). Our riders will be on this section of route between 8:15 and 10:30 am. Since the office start time for Country Roads’ 25-mile route is 10:00 am, most of their riders will not arrive at this point until 10:45 am or later. We anticipate all of our riders to be clear of this stretch before 10:45 am.
- The intersection of Pine Island Turnpike and Blooms Corner Road. At this intersection, our riders are traveling on Pine Island Turnpike straight across Blooms Corner Road. Country Roads’ riders are

traveling on Blooms Corner Road straight across Pine Island Turnpike. There is no intersection besides the intersection itself. We propose that BRAKING AIDS® Ride hire a police officer to be stationed at that intersection between 8:30 and 10:45 am to ensure that no one gets confused and everyone is safe. Beyond these two locations, we have adjusted our routes to eliminate any overlap in Warwick.

Additionally, as a matter of course, we have an extensive safety plan in place for the ride:

- All participants are required to attend a mandatory, hourlong safety orientation in Cooperstown the afternoon before the ride.
- Riders are cautioned that they are moving vehicles (like any other) and must obey traffic laws, including stopping at all lights and stop signs, and riding single file. Please note that we are not requesting any road closures.
- Our extensive route signage package clearly marks our route. (Country Roads, in contrast, uses chalk markings on the street so there will be no confusion.)
- We have a team of Motorcycle Safety volunteers who we station at tricky intersections to guide riders across the street. (They do not direct motor traffic.)
- We also have a team of 10 sweep vehicles to give a lift to any riders who need one.
- We maintain a command center at our office during all hours that the route is open. All riders wear a wristband with the phone number on it. Our command center is also available to coordinate with your police and Country Roads' leadership team during the day of the event.

We are eager to work with you to ensure a successful event for all. To that end:

- We carry a \$5 million event liability policy and will name you as additional insured as required on your application.
- We will be happy to meet with the Town Board at a designated time.
- As needed, we will hire officers in Warwick to ensure the safe flow of traffic, both bicycles and motor vehicles.
- We will be happy to meet with the police chief or his representative one-on-one to identify any trouble spots and work out solutions in advance.
- We are committed to coordinating with OCBC through the day of the event to ensure everyone's success.

While we recognize that the timing of our ride is not ideal for the Town, we are committed to being good guests as we endeavor to raise over \$250,000 for Housing Works in their efforts to end the AIDS epidemic in New York State by 2020.


