BOARD'S DISCUSSION ON CORRESPONDENCE: There were no discussions made on the correspondence.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND DEPARTMENT HEADS:

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER - Thank you, Supervisor. I just have a few items to discuss with the board tonight. I attended the graduation ceremony for the Orange County Police Academy this morning. Our department congratulates our newest officers, Chase Toth, Kole LoSchiavo, and Timothy Vreeland, on successfully completing the Academy's intensive six-month training program. Additionally, Officer Vreeland received the Academic Achievement Award while Officer LoSchiavo earned the Physical Fitness Award. All three officers will begin their field training program with the department on Monday.

Construction began this week on the grant-funded Police Station Renovation Project. This project is expected to last approximately six months, while operations will continue uninterrupted throughout the renovation and there may be occasional inconveniences as we progress. We appreciate the public's patience and understanding during this process.

The department will be participating in the Mental Health Awareness Celebration on Railroad Green this Saturday from 12 p.m. to 4 p.m. in support of this year's theme, Youth, Mental Health, and Wellness. We strongly encourage community members to attend this important event.

This week also marks National Police Week, a time to recognize and honor the service and sacrifice of our law enforcement officers across the country, particularly those who have given their lives in the line of duty. We thank the members of our department, our law enforcement professionals, for their continued dedication to protecting and serving our community. I also want to thank the Town Board for the social media posts that went out earlier this week, as well as the residents that have been dropping off some food to our staff. That's all I have unless there's any questions from the Board.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you, Chief, and I just want to add to that. After I read the statement that I put out on social media, I was thinking about it, and just as our first responders, our volunteer EMTs and fire department members, we also have to thank the spouses and the family members that allow their husbands and wives and brothers and sisters to do the work that most people will not and cannot do. So, we also keep the spouses and the family members in our thoughts as their family members do a very dangerous job and one that is widely needed in our community. So, thank you, and thank you to your family for allowing you to do what you've done for so many years.

POLICE CHIEF JOHN RADER - We appreciate that. Thank you, sir.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you.

DPW FOREMAN WALTER SHULTZ – Good evening, everybody. We're doing a bunch of work on Minturn Road, replacing a bunch of the driveway pipes, and we're going to do some crossovers pretty soon. We did one on Lower Hillman, across the road, trying to prepare, I guess, for paving. Minturn Road and East Ridge, we are ditching, cleaning them up, and then doing numerous amounts of that. Iron Mountain, we had some dead trees to cleanup that we did. And let me see here. Mowing, we're doing cul-de-sacs, I've got the boom mower out starting to mow roadsides. Pothole Repair, we're just going with the complaints, and then they're just riding around with the hot box, filling holes. Then sweeping, he's been sweeping the intersections and all the developments right now, trying to clean that up. Road signs, whatever gets knocked down, Anthony's been fixing them. We've been hauling in some item for all the pipe work we've been doing, so we're going through that. The town parks they are mowing and taking care of the bathrooms and doing their normal thing.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATT MCPHERSON – Good evening, just a few quick items tonight. It's a busy time of the year for us with the summer water at Greenwood Lake, with how bad the winter was this past winter. There have been a lot more leaks this year, I guess, than I can ever remember in the past. But the system is fully on. We fixed leaks that replaced pipe on several roads through Indian Park and Furnace Brook. We still have several spots in the road to patch, and I'll coordinate that with the DPW to get all the spots patched.

We replaced the leaking water line. There's been a chronic problem for us on Park Drive and Wickham Knolls. The Pine Island Well Project, the DEC still has the application under review after all this time. The supervisor and myself continue to try and nudge them along to get the well put online, but until the final approval is given, we cannot use the well.

We've been doing a lot of 2026 Orange County Health Department inspections at our water facilities outside of the recommended repairs or minor system updates. The reports have come back mostly good.

The sewer plants have been running mostly well with no notable disasters this past month. We've been within the limits the past few months, and we're only making small repairs and doing maintenance to keep them going. That's all I have.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Any questions for Matt? Thank you, Matt. I know it was a lot of work getting that summer water turned on, especially after the brutal winter that we had, so good job to the guys.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATT MCPHERSON - Yeah, it's been tough.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Will give the Recreation Report on behalf of the Recreation Director, Sam Walter. Thank you. The pool work continues as we prepare for opening day Saturday, May 23rd. Water is being delivered tomorrow, and a new fence will be going up early next week as well. Lifeguard orientation is on Sunday. Starting in July, besides swim lessons, we are now able to offer senior aqua fitness classes on Thursday mornings in the heated pool. That sounds pretty good. This is going to be a free program for seniors, and it's with the help of a local nonprofit called Small Things that is able to provide this program to our seniors. Samantha Walters will be posting information soon as how to register for the program, and she'll make sure all the senior centers have the information as well. Thank you, Small Things, for helping bring such a great program to our seniors.

Pool membership passes are now on sale at Town Hall. Best prices are now as prices go up on June 1st. Hope you can join us this summer at the pools.

For the other parks, the park has been busy with pickleball clinics, spring weddings, and retreats. At a recent field trip Sanfordville Elementary School, students visited and learned about pond ecosystems, habitats, and biodiversity. They also hid their natural insect homes along the hiking trail called Hidden Hollow Trail, and they made small boats to float or sink down the pond's outlet stream. It was a great day. We got to thank the park volunteers for their work on the trails, and the supervisor came out to welcome the children, their families, and you could really see how much the residents were enjoying the park.

There's great news. The Hudson River Valley Greenway Council, specifically the McHenry Community Planning Grant, has just awarded the Town of Warwick a \$20,000 grant for developing a park master plan for Wickham Woods Park. It's a great park, and it's going to be even better with some great planning for the future. Thank you to all the local groups that wrote letters of support for this grant, including the Mearns Bird Club, Sustainable Warwick, Sue Gardner, the Town Historian, Village Mayor Newhard, and the Warwick Golden Seniors, and the local Boy Scout Troops, 45 and more. That's her report.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you. Michael, not to put you on the spot, but did you want to report on anything? Coolest Recycling Drive and any other updates from Climate Smart?

MICHAEL HELME - Chairman, Climate Smart Community Advisory Board - Yes. Okay. So, I wanted to thank the town. I forgot my sunglasses. I want to thank the town for, once again, working with Sustainable Warwick on Coolest Recycling Drive. This year we've

collected more than 200 appliances. We've got 16 air Conditioners that we gave to Sam at Mountain Lake Park. People said they were still usable. One person came in and said they got heat pumps for their homes, and so they had these window air conditioners they just want to get rid of, but they were perfectly good. So, she has those and one mini-fridge. I think we helped residents save about \$3,000 on the recycling fees doing this, and, of course, we avoided estimated emissions of about 160 metric tons of carbon dioxide equivalent, which is a lot considering we spent less than \$1,000. The DEC will be hosting a Climate Solutions Summit in Utica where they're asking me to talk about the Coolest Recycling Drive. People all over the state will be learning about this example that you've set here in Warwick.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Great. Well, great job, Michael. We appreciate your work on that and the energy audit that you're doing for us, which is saving us money every time you look at something. So, keep up the great work. Thank you.

TOWN BOARD REPORTS:

COUNCILMAN DEANGELO - For the Warwick Valley Humane Society, the shelter has an assortment of animals for adoption, big and small dogs, cats and kittens, white, ruby-eyed rats, rabbits, budgies, a.k.a. parakeets, and two hamsters.

They're having an upcoming fundraiser, a Weiner and Friends Fest, May 30th, at the Warwick Dog Park on Union Corners Road from 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The event will include a costume parade, contests, prizes, vendors, and food trucks, and it's only a \$20 entry fee per family. Sponsor banners are available. Contact Warwick Humane at 845-986-2473. It will be a tail-wagging good time.

Their daily supplies are low. They need paper towels, bleach, simple green cleaner, distilled white vinegar, 13-gallon scent-free garbage bags, and pâté-style canned cat and kitten food. That's all I have for the Humane Society.

For the Town of Warwick Friendly Visitor Program, I have two months here. For March, the number of neighbors assisted was 42. The total number of volunteers assisting those neighbors was 26. The total number of services provided by those 26 neighbors was 273. The total number of hours provided by them was 177.20. That's for March.

For April, the number of neighbors assisted was 38. The total number of volunteers assisting them was 29. Those 29 volunteers put in or put up 279 services for a total number of hours of 204. And that's all I have. Thank you.

COUNCILMAN KOWAL - Well, this weekend is our big weekend for the Founders' Day. The celebration of our 250th anniversary continues. It's going to be at the Stonewall Inn on County Route 1 and it's going to go from one to four. There's going to be reenactors. There's going to be families there that were here during the Revolutionary Period. You can interview them, see how they contributed to the Revolutionary War, how they lived, how they reacted to what was going on at that time. You get a little bit more insight on that.

Something to keep your eyes out on your calendar is on June 6th, up in Greenwood Lake, an organization affiliated with West Point is also going to have some events up there where

they're going to have a Medal of Honor winner or award person. They're going to have the chain link on display there and they're going to have other events and reenactments up there as well. I think it will probably be on the town website. There's going to be a link to it. I just got this information today. I'm looking forward to participating in that, too. Plus, also pencil in the 4th of July to bring it up in Greenwood Lake. I think it's going to be fabulous. That's all I have.

COUNCILMAN MATTINGLY - It's starting to be summertime, so there's a lot of events going on throughout our town and villages. The Warwick Valley Chamber of Commerce, has two ribbon cuttings coming up. Bare Aesthetics and MedSpa Grand Opening is Friday, May 15th. That's tomorrow from 3:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. 127 Route 94, Unit 1 in Warwick. Admission is free. The ribbon cutting for Access PT is also tomorrow at 4:00 p.m., 13 Forester Avenue in Warwick. The Winslow Therapeutic Center Duck Derby is the 35th Annual Duck Derby. It is Sunday, May 17th in the Village of Warwick along Wawayanda Creek from 1:00 p.m. to 2:00 p.m. Admission is free. There is no fee for admission, but ducks are \$5 each. SUPERVISOR DWYER - All right, my report. Starting with the road work, obviously if you've driven here, you probably encountered some degree of traffic or road work throughout our town and villages. That is going to continue until the fall, and then it will restart again next year. There are a lot of projects happening throughout the Town of Warwick right now. Some may argue more than they should have. But it's all for a good purpose, for a good reason. They're trying to rebuild the infrastructure throughout Warwick, provide new sidewalks in our downtowns, and better roads for all of us to travel on. It's going to get more painful before it gets better, I assure you of that. We heard that the roundabout, which was originally scheduled for the spring of this year, has been pushed to next year, and that is because they identified a conflicting detour with the culvert project that is soon to begin at Larry's Deli. The Homestead Village area box culvert is a single lane only at this point in time, and that's going to continue for the next three to four weeks, and possibly up to five weeks. But once that's wrapped up, they're going to move to the box culvert in the Village of Warwick right by Larry's Deli, and there will be a detour there that will be a full road closure by Larry's Deli just east of South Street. They're continuing to work in the downtowns, the Village of Warwick and the Village of Florida. It's been an incredible burden, I'm sure, for a lot of the business owners. Please support your local businesses as best as you possibly can during this time because I'm sure it is quite a struggle for them to get by.

From a town infrastructure standpoint, we are nearly complete with the Mountain Lake Park pool project. We did construct a new pool at Mountain Lake Park, a kiddie pool, to try to get some of the younger kids out of the larger pools and give them a safer area where they can learn to swim. Those projects are moving ahead full steam. We also did some fixing up of the old pools. They're very old pools that really were in quite a bit of disrepair. They needed a lot of work to be done, so we're almost done with all that, and we are on target to open right after Memorial Day, and that project is moving full steam ahead.

At the last Town Board Meeting, I mentioned that we applied for a \$1.5 million salt barn grant through U.S. Congressman Pat Ryan's office. We received confirmation that Pat Ryan will be submitting that to the federal budget for full funding for the project, so it's not a guarantee of grant funding or award, but it is a necessary step toward receiving grant funding for a new salt barn for the Town of Warwick.

As you heard today during the public hearing, we are applying for \$275,000 to support new bathrooms as well as parking improvements and a first aid station at Mountain Lake Park right by the pickleball courts.

The Jayne Street Bridge project is moving ahead quite well. We're nearly at 40 percent design. This is a state-funded, grant-funded project that will be between \$4 million and \$6 million, so it's a very large project. We've got to follow the very restrictive design standards that the New York State DOT has set since this is funded by the New York State DOT. It's a town bridge, town project that we got grant money for, and any time you get grant money from the State of New York or anywhere, all that means is it's going to cost more and it's going to take more time. So, you know, for the people of the Village of Florida, this bridge has been closed for many years. We're doing everything we can to get this moving as quickly as possible. Once we have the 40 percent design done, we'll be able to get another cost estimate of the project, which we anticipate, as I said, to be between \$4 million and \$6 million. Inflation has skyrocketed and the cost of materials has really risen quite dramatically, so we expect the number is going to be closer to six.

We're making great progress on the multi-use trail. This is a project that is jointly being conducted between the Village of Warwick and the Town of Warwick to construct a multi-use trail between the downtown Village of Warwick and the Central Shopping District by Price Chopper and ShopRite. This will be similar to the Heritage Trail that runs through Goshen, where you can ride a bike, you can walk, you can recreate, and basically commute, if you will, from the downtown Village of Warwick to Price Chopper's ShopRite area. The mayor and I are both partnering on this, and we're meeting with each of the stakeholders along the route to get support, get buy-in. We've met with almost all of them, and every single property owner along that route is incredibly supportive. We're working on some minor easements that need to happen along the route. Additionally, the Town of Warwick has applied for funding from Orange County to purchase a 27-acre parcel of land on Route 94 South, just on the north side of Price Chopper. That is a great piece of land that will essentially serve as a midway park between the Village of Warwick and ShopRite Price Chopper area, and it'll be a public park that is open to the general public. It could be an

animal sanctuary, bird sanctuary, and a really nice place for people to enjoy as they're walking that trail.

Let's see. We are making great progress on the Arboretum and Amphitheater at Wickham Woodlands Park. This is a fully grant-funded project that will build an amphitheater right overlooking the water within the prison property, as well as a new arboretum that will be a new public park within the fence line. So, if you go to the prison complex and you walk around the loop and you notice that there's a fence, a big fence, separating the interior park from the exterior park, that whole section inside will become a full arboretum and an amphitheater where we intend to have concerts, plays, and educational activities and things like that. We're really looking forward to getting that project going, and we expect to break ground probably in the summer or the fall for that project.

Centennial Park, located in the Village of Greenwood Lake, is another project that the town is undertaking to convert what was an old house that was purchased by the town about six or seven years ago, and that is going to be Centennial Park, an addition of the Thomas Morahan Waterfront Park, but it will commemorate the village's 100-year anniversary that they celebrated last year.

We have engaged with a company called Venergy Solutions to do a full energy audit on every single town building, including all of our water buildings, sewer buildings, public park buildings. Obviously, as we're all-seeing energy costs skyrocket, it's up to us to make sure that we're keeping those costs under control as best we can. So, we're going to do a comprehensive, no-cost energy audit to evaluate every single one of these buildings and determine ways that we can possibly save some money on our energy costs.

The Town Board and the committee have been working very hard on a battery energy storage law led by Councilman Kowal, and we expect to be presenting that to the Town Board, I would say, if not at our next meeting, the following meeting. That will be a law prohibiting large-scale battery storage facilities within the Town of Warwick, and it will be open to public hearing, where we'll present it for public comment, and anyone who has anything to say about that will have a really good opportunity to do so during the public hearing portion of that process.

I started two months ago an initiative called Coffee with the Supervisor, where myself, along with all of our town department heads, go to a different part of town every month, and we have coffee with each other, we have coffee with the public. It's been a great way for not only department heads to finally meet each other, some of whom have never met, we've got a lot of department heads, and Dial-A-Bus was able to meet Matt, and recreation director, and other people. It's been a great opportunity to collaborate and work on different initiatives, but it's really been a valuable experience to see residents being able to come to one location, not town hall, but go to a location where you have a captive audience of all department heads, myself, the town board members, and you can ask questions, get answers to things, and really work to solve problems. This initiative, Warwick is the biggest town in Orange County, so this allows us to bring our department heads to every corner of the Town of Warwick. We plan on doing this every single month indefinitely. It's not a four

and done. The next one will be in the Village of Florida, and that'll be June 16th, and then the following one will be in Greenwood Lake on July 21st, and then we will announce the next locations and the next rounds of those meetings going forward. They're obviously open to the public, and we encourage anyone to come meet with myself, the Police Chief, DPW, Water, Sewer, Parks, the Town Assessor, the Town Clerk, the Dial-a-Bus, you name it, Building Inspector, everyone's there. It's great.

At the last meeting, I announced that we were looking to revive the Architectural Review Board within the Town of Warwick. This is a committee that exists in town law but has been inactive for many years. The last project that they worked on was Price Chopper many, many years ago. We received immediately after the notification on Facebook 15 applicants for people who wanted to join the Architectural Review Board, and it was incredible the number of licensed architects who wanted to be on the committee. I don't know if we want seven licensed architects all arguing about architectural design. I don't know how much progress we'd make, so we're going to make it a really nice committee of licensed architects as well as other professionals that are in that world. So, at the next town board meeting, we're continuing to interview applicants for the membership on the ARB, and at the next town board meeting, we will be selecting and appointing those members to fill that very important board.

The Town Board will be applying for a green initiative grant program to install water meters, not only install but replace all of our water meters throughout the town's water districts. We have seven or nine water districts.

WATER & SEWER, DEPUTY COMMISSIONER MATT MCPHERSON – Nine.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Nine water districts throughout the town of Warwick, and it's critical that each of those households and commercial businesses are metered, and unfortunately the small number of users we have that are on meters, those meters are outdated. So, we're going to apply for a grant to not only replace those meters but put new meters where they don't currently exist.

just a quick PDR update. We have two farms that are going to be closing within the next month, Burt Farm, which is just outside of the Village of Warwick, which is a 120-acre farm, as well as the Tice Shepherd Farm, which is a farm located on Jessup Road, which is 62 acres. Both of those will be closing very soon. We have two applications for PDR in progress. One is a 24-acre parcel on Route 94 south, which I described before, and the other is a 30-acre tree farm. In addition, we have the 300-acre Conference Center Woodlands area that we've applied for but is also scheduled to close regardless of grant funding in August of this year. So that will be preserved, 300-acre property, forever preserved, never to be developed within the town. At this time, that concludes my report, and we will move into privilege of the floor on any agenda items. So, we will have a public comment on anything after we go through the agenda items, but if anyone would like to comment on agenda items before we vote on resolutions, now would be your time to do so. Anyone want to comment on resolutions? Okay.

#R2026-199 RESOLUTION ADOPTING INTRODUCTORY LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF 2026 - TOWN OF WARWICK TOWN BOARD MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF PEDDLER'S AND/OR SOLICITOR'S PERMITS AND LICENSES

Motion Councilman Kowal, seconded Councilman Mattingly to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, The Town Board of the Town of Warwick ("Town Board") finds that there is a critical public interest need to impose a six (6) month moratorium on the issuance of commercial door-to-door peddling and/or soliciting permits and licenses ("Moratorium"), and

WHEREAS, Chapter 112, titled "Peddling and Soliciting," of the Code of the Town of Warwick currently contains permit and license requirements for commercial peddlers and solicitors, which establishes a regulatory framework related to peddlers and/or solicitors. It has come to the Town Board attention that the act(s) of peddling and/or solicitation can be alarming to Town residents, particularly when the peddler and/or solicitor knocks on a resident's door, rings their doorbell, or otherwise attempts to contact that resident while in their residence and

WHEREAS, The Town Board finds that Chapter 112 of the Town Code established initial requirements governing commercial peddling and solicitation, but that the standards prescribed for these permits and licenses do not adequately address the welfare and safety concerns that have come to the Town Board attention including but not limited to, a lack of criminal history searches/background checks of peddlers and/or solicitors, a lack of protection of residents' tranquility and privacy and a mechanism for Town residents to opt out of unwanted contact from peddlers and/or solicitors at their residences, and

WHEREAS, Considering the safety, well-being and privacy concerns among the community associated with solicitors and/or peddlers soliciting on private property, for the well-being of both peddlers and/or solicitors and Town residents, these circumstances require that the Town Board undertake, without delay, a review of the existing sections of Chapter 112 of the Town Code in order to determine whether and/or how these regulations should be amended, particularly with regard to the feasibility of more stringent licensing requirements and procedures, as well as the implementation of a "no knock" registry containing a list of property owners within the Town that opt out of being subject to peddling and/or solicitation, and

WHEREAS, This Moratorium will not apply to bona fide not-for-profit

organizations and their employees or members, religious or political door to door activity. This moratorium shall not apply to local utility companies providing service within the Town of Warwick such as Orange & Rockland Utility Company, WVT Fiber (Archtop Fiber) and Optimum Online, and

WHEREAS, a duly noticed public hearing was held this day May 14, 2026.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the proposed Introductory Local Law No. 1 is hereby adopted as Local Law No. 1 of 2026 to be number in accordance with law; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED that the Town Board hereby directs the Town Clerk to enter said Local Law in the minutes of this meeting and, , to enter such law in the Local Law Book of the Town of Warwick, and

to give due notice of the adoption of said Local Law to the Secretary of State of New York and to take all steps to process and file said Local Law amendment with the State of New York

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that such Local Law will be designated as:

LOCAL LAW NO. 1 OF 2026

A LOCAL LAW IMPLEMENTING A MORATORIUM ON THE ISSUANCE OF LICENSES AND PERMITS FOR DOOR-TO-DOOR COMMERCIAL SOLICITORS AND/OR PEDDLERS

Be it enacted by the Town Board of the Town of Warwick as follows:

Section 1. Legislative findings and intent.

The Town Board ("Board") of the Town of Warwick, New York ("Town") hereby finds that there is a critical and compelling need, in the public interest as set forth herein, to impose a six-month Moratorium on commercial door-to-door soliciting permits as further described hereafter.

- A. The Town previously undertook regulations with respect Peddling and Solicitation as defined in the Town of Warwick Code Chapter 112. A peddler as defined therein is any person, agent, consignee, owner or employee, traveling by foot or using any type of wagon, cart, vehicle or conveyance whatsoever, whether traveling from place to place or remaining in the same location, who offers or exposes for sale any goods, wares or food of any kind whatsoever, or who makes sales and delivers articles to purchasers, or who solicits orders and, as a separate transaction, makes deliveries to purchasers. The term "peddler" shall include "hawker" or "huckster."
- B. A solicitor as defined therein is any person, whether as owner, agent, cosigner or employee, traveling by foot or by any type of wagon, cart, vehicle or conveyance whatsoever from place to place, house to house or street to street who takes to attempts to take orders for future delivery for goods,

magazines, wares, merchandise, personal property of any kind whatsoever or for services to be performed or furnished at a future date, whether or not advance payment is collected. Such definition shall include any person who temporarily hires, leases, uses or occupies any premises or part thereof for the sole purpose of exhibiting

- C. samples and/or taking orders for future delivery.
- D. Under the current legislative framework, Town Code Section 112 requires that any person wishing to engage in the business of a peddler or solicitor as defined in Section 112, above, within the bounds of the Town of Warwick must first apply for and subsequently obtain a permit from the Town of Warwick to do so.
- E. The inclusion of the license requirement was an attempt to establish regulatory framework related to peddlers and/or solicitors as it had come to the Town Board's attention that the act(s) of solicitation and/or peddling can be alarming to Town Residents. It has since come to the Town Board's attention that this cause for concern becomes more acute when the solicitor knocks on someone's door, rings their doorbell, or otherwise attempts to contact that individual while the resident is in their abode.
- F. Forever, throughout the duration of this Moratorium the Board will review the feasibility of more stringent licensing application requirements related to those applicants seeking licensing related to soliciting and/or peddling goods within the bounds of the town and to allow residents to opt out of solicitation by being included in a no-knock registry to be provided to door-to-door solicitors.
- G. The Town Board finds that the Town Code Section related to peddling and solicitation established initial requirements governing Peddling and Solicitation. However, the standards prescribed for these licenses do not adequately address the safety concerns that have come to the board's attention including but not limited to, a lack of criminal history searches/background checks, the ability to solicit and/or peddle on private property, and no current mechanism by which, at present, for residents to "opt out," of receiving solicitors or peddlers on their private property. Moreover, there are also community concerns that have been brought to the Board's attention that penalties for non-compliance may not be adequate at this juncture.
- H. Considering the large concern amongst the community associated with solicitors and/or peddlers soliciting on private property, with perceived and potential lax enforcement mechanisms present in the current legislative framework, amid rampant privacy as well as safety concerns, for the well-

being of both peddlers/solicitors as well as home-owners, these circumstances require that the Town Board undertake, without delay, a review of the existing sections of the Town Code related to Peddling and Solicitation in order to determine whether these regulations should be amended or otherwise changed, particularly with regard to matters related to the feasibility of a more stringent licensing procedure, as well as an enforced "no knock," list of property owners within the Town, to ensure that Peddlers and Solicitors do not present themselves on private property.

- I. The Town Board hereby finds that the adoption of a moratorium on the issuance of permits related to commercial, door-to-door peddling and/or soliciting is required in order to best maintain the status quo during the study period in order to
- J. prevent interim action, friction, interaction or issues between door-to-door solicitors/peddlers and Town residents from frustrating the objectives of the study.
- K. This Moratorium will not apply to bona fide not-for-profit organizations and their employees or members, religious or political door to door activity. This moratorium shall not apply to local utility companies providing service within the Town of Warwick such as Orange & Rockland Utility Company, WVT Fiber (Archtop Fiber) and Optimum Online.

Section 2. Scope of Moratorium.

Moratorium on the issuance of all peddling and/or soliciting applications and permits for door-to-door commercial peddling and/or soliciting by the Town Clerk or any other Official, Employee Board or entity of the Town of Warwick.

This Law will not otherwise void, nullify, or in any way supersede, interfere with, contradict or modify any code sections related to enforcement, penalization and/or prosecution of individuals or entities who violate the current Town Code Sections related to peddling and solicitation licensing and permission, while this Moratorium is in effect. Nothing herein should be construed to allow commercial door-to-door peddling and/or solicitation during this period, as the Moratorium is only related to the issuance of the permits, not as to the requirement to possess a duly issued permit related to peddling and/or solicitation.

Section 3. Application of Law to existing applications.

This Local Law shall supersede any and all Town Law or other provisions of law, rule or regulation that require specific action upon an application related to the issuance of a peddler's or solicitor's permit, or license or ability to do so. The Moratorium will be effective to any permits that have been issued within 30 days of the passage of this Local Law. This Moratorium is being adopted by Local Law pursuant to Municipal Home Rule Law procedures and this Moratorium suspends any ability of the

Town of Warwick to issue Peddler or Solicitor's Permits. This Moratorium supersedes any Town Law or Town Code provisions to the contrary that require any specific action on an application by any Town Board, or Town Official or Employee within the Town. This Moratorium Law also supersedes any New York State or Local Laws, rules or regulations pertaining to the grant of any variance authority by any relevant Board of Appeals, related to the issuance or denial of permits under the current Town Code it being the intention of this Local Law that any grant of permission related to any permit by any employee, Board, or Official is hereby superseded by this Local Law.

Section 4. Expiration of moratorium.

This Local Law shall expire without further action of the Town Board six (6) months following the effective date hereof and thereafter shall be of no force or effect. However, if it

appears that any required review and study referred to hereinabove will not be completed within six (6) months from the effective date of this Local Law, the Town Board may, by Local Law, extend the period of this Moratorium for an additional six (6) months or for such other time period that the Town Board determines is reasonable in scope and duration.

Section 5. State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Pursuant to 6 NYCRR 617.5 (30) this Local Law is classified as Type II action which requires no further review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act.

Section 6. Severability.

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or part of this Local Law shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder hereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, section or part hereof directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment shall have been rendered.

Section 7. Effective date.

This Local Law shall become effective immediately upon being filed with the Secretary of State.

PRIVILEGE OF THE FLOOR (GENERAL):

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Are you guys here for some school project or civic responsibility?

AIDEN CULLEN - Boy Scout Troop 45, Warwick, NY – For the citizenship and community merit badge.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Do you have to ask any questions or do anything? Because we only give you credit if you actually stand up and ask a question. Here, come on up. Introduce yourself. You can do it. Come up to the podium and introduce yourself. You get a good start. There's only 10,000 people watching from home. Although a lot of them may have left after that one resolution, to be honest with you.

AIDEN CULLEN - Hi, I'm with the Troop 45 Warwick. I have a question about specifically the road work. I heard about the situation with Florida's main street. I heard it's not really in good shape. What's the deal with that? How is the road work on that street going to be carried out?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - It's a great question. It's a very difficult situation because we've got old infrastructure. Old roads, old bridges, old pipes under the roads. Potholes, as I'm sure you've noticed before they started this. It looks like it's even worse than when they started. You wonder, what are they actually doing? Are they fixing anything or are they making it worse? The problem with projects like this is you have to almost make it worse before it gets any better. We had a news reporter report the worst main street and basically declaring Florida as the worst main street. Completely omitting the fact that it's under construction and getting a major uplift through state resources. We consider ourselves very

lucky because this is a state-funded project where they're spending \$30 million to rehab our infrastructure and our roads. Unfortunately, you have to walk a fine line between killing local businesses and repairing infrastructure. I think the state is doing a great job. I think the contractors are doing a great job. You're hearing a lot of complaints from residents, but I don't know which was louder when they were complaining about the potholes or they're complaining about traffic. It's a very tricky situation. We're grateful that the state is making the investment in the Town of Warwick. It's going to take a little bit longer. They've got a lot more work that they have to do not only in the Village of Florida, but the Village of Warwick and a lot of our other town roads. We just have to be patient and know and understand that it's for the greater good. The long-term benefit of this big investment is going to far outweigh the short-term inconvenience that we're all feeling.

AIDEN CULLEN - Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Thank you for coming up. We appreciate you coming to our board meeting and good luck with your scouting journey.

AIDEN CULLEN - Thank you.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Did you have anything? Did you want to come up and ask a question?

RESIDENT - I don't have any questions.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - You can introduce yourself. You can talk about anything you want. You can, not say anything. I was joking. I won't tell your scout leader or anything, but you have an opportunity if you wanted to ask anything. You came to a good meeting. There's a lot of interesting stuff.

STEPHANIE - Resident - Can I ask a question?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Of course you may. If you wouldn't mind coming up to the podium and stating your name for the record. You don't have to. You don't have to if you don't want to. So, then you can just ask your question from the seat if you'd like.

STEPHANIE - I was just wondering how we can put in bids, like the pavement companies that put in bids. Do you guys seek out companies, or can a company come to you and put in a bid?

SUPERVISOR DWYER - For which paving? Like what the state's doing or the work that we're going to do in the town?

STEPHANIE - For the Warwick Transit.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Oh, the seal coating.

STEPHANIE - I know you guys just focused on this now. But for, say, like future projects that you guys are seeking out, like, you know, other paving companies in the area.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - Yeah. So historically what we would do, if it's under a certain dollar amount, we would just go to companies that we know. You have to get a minimum of three quotes. So, in this case, we got four quotes from four companies that we know are in the seal coating business. But if you have or know someone with a seal coating or paving company, they can drop off a card to either me or the DPW and whenever these bids come up, they'll put them on the list of people to contact. That goes for anything. If you're a plumber, if you're an engineer, if you're an architect, if you're, you know, a sludge hauler. Whatever you are, we don't know what you do unless you bring us a card and let us know that you're interested in the job. Now, if it's a larger job, say, a public works contract greater than \$35,000, then we have to go out to an RFP, which is a request for proposals. And we would publish the notification in the newspaper. We would announce it here for any larger bids. When we do our paving, like our million-dollar paving work that we try to do every year, that we usually piggyback off of the state contract. So, the state will award a bid for a regional contractor to do all the major paving work. They would put a dollar value per ton and we would just use that contract, which we're allowed to do. Most local contractors can't generally do a million dollars' worth of paving that we found anywhere. They're not interested in it or their price would be too high because they don't do enough volume. But the smaller contracts, like seal coating parking lots, just drop off a card, and we'd be more than happy to call you.


STEPHANIE - Great.

SUPERVISOR DWYER - No problem.

NEXT MEETING: Supervisor Dwyer stated the next Town Board Meeting will be held on Thursday, May 28, 2026 at 7:00 p.m. and as always, it may be preceded by a workshop as early as 5:30 p.m. and I would like to thank everybody for coming here tonight.
